After a chat with Nellie — who to the astonishment of everyone, having lived in Montezuma and Port Byron for over 70 years, pulled up stakes on June 26 to continue to care for Father K. and the rectory at Rush — off toward Hornell.

Atwell answered the bell, and exclaimed, "Well, see what happens when the doors are left open. Welcome." Yes. Like Pope John's open windows. Strange things blow in. "Will you stay for supper? Father A. called Mrs. Coyne, and we sat as she described the death and funeral of her sister. Mrs. Cullinan had been a high school teacher in Avon who never was deceived by the John Deweyism which made a debacle of education. She ran her classes with a firm hand. She expected the most from every potential. As a result a myriad of her former pupils crowded the wake and funeral to express their esteem, and cheerfully to recall the discipline and expectations of a teacher they greatly admired. **Most of us are grateful to the firm teachers who insist on our using our potential rather than those cream-puff teachers who want us to be jolly while neglecting our duty.**
