Hospital Ministry Grows in Aubur

Auburn — Lay teams from St. Mary's Parish are getting more involved in hospital ministry through a new program of visiting and distributing Holy Communion to parishioners hospitalized at Auburn Memorial Hospital.

Team members, identifiable by badges reading Parish Visitor of St. Mary's are fulfilling |Christ's admonition to visit the sick.

The program started up two months ago under the supervision of Sister Dorothy Quinn, pastoral assistant. The group is divided into five teams with two members each Each team has the responsibility for one week to visit all hospitalized parishioners and ask if they wish to receive Communion. Those who do are given a book of prayers. The team then brings them Communion the following day.

The program has proved to be a blessing to parishioners and team members.

It is a reminder of the concern of the pastor, Msgr. James D. Cuffney, and his people through the extension of the meaning of the Eucharist as a community of faith to the parish family who can not be present at worship.

"Our reception as laymen by the patients has been wonderful,"

agreed Carl McDermott and Mrs. Charles Phillips, one of the visiting teams. "We at St. Mary's have beem familiar with the Service, Family concept so this may have been an introduction for our parishioners. The service families are families from the various city parishes who bring communion to nursing homes each Sunday and our program is really an extension of this concept.

"Ten years ago I might have been hesitant about involvement in a program such as this. But we have all come to realize that as Christ came to be with us through the Eucharist, this hospital parish visiting program is one way we can bring Christ to others through the Eucharist. This is a way we can share the convictions of our own faith," McDermott said.

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
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
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From Father Richard Kraft, SVD:
