Canandaigua — Birthright-Canandaigua, a free information and referral service for women seeking alternatives to abortion, came into being Sept. 8 when telephones were hooked up in a rent-free office on South Main Street. The number is 315/394-8737.

message will list available services and provide an additional number for emergency use.

Birthright's goal is to save the possibly "unwanted" child by showing the expectant mother how she can keep her baby or have it adopted.

More than 40 women have been trained to answer questions telephoned between the hours of 10 a.m. and 1 p.m., and from 7 until 9 p.m., Monday through Friday. At other times, a recorded

Sue Greiner, a member of the steering committee, pointed out that Birthright aims to serve "anyone who is pregnant, and troubled or confused about it."

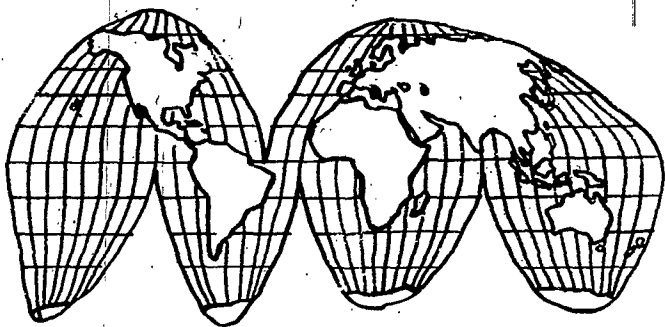
It provides access to financial and legal assistance, medical care and psychological counseling, making use of various programs under government or private sponsorship, she said. She stressed the confidential nature of the proceedings, noting that that is a requirement of the international Birthright system.

The office volunteers are trained to assess the needs of callers. They can arrange for pregnancy tests and for counseling, as needed, with social workers, clergymen, lawyers, etc. They also can arrange appointments for those needing financial assistance.

Planning for Birthright-Canandaigua was undertaken last February by nine women from St. Mary's parish. It is a voluntary, non-sectarian, non-profit project, supported by tax-deductible donations. Checks may be mailed to Birthright-Canandaigua, Box 420, Canandaigua, N.Y. 14424.

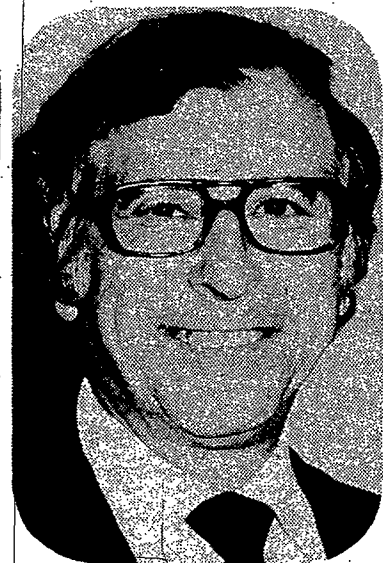

Pope Paul received Ugandan President Idi Amin Dada in private audience last week, reassuring the African leader of his "respect, esteem and love for Uganda." The Pope visited Uganda on his trip to Africa in 1969. Alluding to the expulsion by Amin of 16 Italian Catholic missionary priests, the Pope told Amin, "We were pleased to receive your reply with regard to some recent events concerning Catholic missionaries in Uganda, assuring us that foreign religious personnel would always be welcome in your country." In Warsaw, Cardinal Stefan Wyszynski, primate of Poland, criticized the Communist nation's industrialization policy. He said the policy was being promoted at the expense of agriculture. Anglican Bishop Robert Eames of Derry and Raphoe has called for the ostracizing of sectarian murderers from the Christian community. At least 100 persons have died in sectarian murders in Northern Ireland in 1975, nearly 60 of them Catholic.

The U.S. Catholic Conference's refugee resettlement efforts at Camp Pendleton, Calif., have been commended by the director of the President's Task Force for Indochina. Julia Taft noted that 10,000 refugees have been resettled by the 73-member staff as of early August. The school board of the Catholic Archdiocese of Boston is going to make a new study to make sure Catholic schools are not being used as "havens" for students seeking to avoid busing. Archbishop Joseph L. Bernardin, president of the U.S. Catholic Conference, has warned against the expulsion of Israel from the United Nations and said that "any efforts to deprive Israel of its membership in the international body should be strongly opposed." The largest number ever to attend an archdiocesan function in New Orleans gathered at the new Superdome for a Holy Year Mass last week. Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen delivered the sermon and Pete Fountain played his clarinet during the service. Archbishop Sheen drew laughter when he remarked of the new superdome, "This dome makes the Colosseum in Rome jealous. But I hope the Lions of Detroit never eat the Saints of New Orleans in it." Both are National Football League teams.

The Vatican and Sri Lanka (formerly Ceylon) have agreed to establish top level diplomatic relations. Pope Paul has reaffirmed the Vatican's support of United Nations efforts to promote literacy throughout the world. In a message marking International Literacy Day Sept. 9, sponsored by UNESCO, the Pope declared, "We wish especially to emphasize the major role which UNESCO has played in the field for many years. We reaffirm the support that the Holy See will continue to give to these efforts."
