It is important to know where you have been before you know where you are going, so claim the historians, and Aquinas' Father Stephen Martin wholeheartedly agrees.

"The most interesting way to learn history is to start from where you are," Father stated, while emphasizing "but not through the nostalgia craze.

He maintained people should get a sense of history from their neighborhoods because, "there is history in the land they live on.'

Father Martin practices what he preaches. As librarian for Aquinas Institute he has started a local history collection. At any given time you will find a group of students gathered around Father's City Atlas that dates back to 1875, or his 1920-24 "Plat" books which show the property divisions of Rochester and the surrounding suburbs.

"The kids get a kick out of it." They can look up where they live and find out what was there back in the 1920s," he declared.

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As Father Martin talked about local history his listeners found themselves absorbed in the fascinating tidbits about their community.

Boulevard (now Dewey Avenue) was the site of a race track. At that time there were no Memorial or Driving Park bridges.

In early Rochester days West Main was Buffalo Street, and State was named Carroll Street in honor of Major Carroll, one of the original founders of Rochester, and descendant of John Carroll of Baltimore who signed the Declaration of Independence.

Streets also were named after the other co-founders, Cols. Rochester and Fitzhugh. Father Martin pointed out an interesting fact about how State Street evolved from Carroll Street.

It seems the Major sold his land holdings to the other founders, but in later years his descendants filed suit against the city for property along the river. The city became angered at the proceedings and dropped Carroll's name from the street which was to become one of Rochester's main thoroughfares State Street.

Another fascinating aspect of Father's collection were the 1857 copies of the "Rural New Yorker," a newspaper printed for the farm community. It was a comprehensive paper with items of interest for everyone; domestic hints on animal and crop care, canning, education features, columns and puzzles for the youngsters, articles on world and state affairs and moral evaluations on such heavy subjects as "the Evil of Wealth".

In order to keep the library's bookshelves well-stocked, Father Martin browses through bookstores and has journeyed to Pultneyville, and Springwater in quest of books offered at sales.

The collection is an impressive one. It contains books on Indian hostory; an 1851 publication of the Phelps-Gorham\* land purchases; a 1915 Rochester directory; Arch Merrill's books on area folklore and history, and many other volumes relating to our Genesee Country heritage:

Reading local 'history is recreational for Father Martin although with his duties as English and history teacher as well as being moderator of the Aquinas debating team school vacations are the only times he is able to pursue his hobby

Father Martin is looking forward to a successful year for acquiring books. Because of the bicenntenial celebration reprints of many New York State histories are being published.
