

Smaller, Faster, Tougher

When Aquinas opened up its 1975 football season under the lamps a few weeks ago at Edgerton Park, it must have stimulated a lot of memories among older Little Irish fans and alumni in the stands.

It was at Edgerton Park in the late 1940s that Aquinas football began its curious trip to national school fame high and recognition, only to drop squarely back home among its Rochester brethren a decade later.

While the big teams from Chicago, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Texas and Nebraska are no longer on Aquinas schedules, the Little Irish still mix it up with the boys from Syracuse (as they did, and defeated, back in the late 40s) and come out on top.

Aquinas' 34-16 opening win over Nottingham of the Salt City, reportedly among the top three teams in the Syracuse area, didn't harm the team's stand with the local coaches who put together the weekly Times-Union coaches' football. poll.

The Irish, already picked by many as the team to beat in City-Catholic League circles, emerged in top spot in the local ratings, far ahead of second place Rush-Henrietta, third place East Rochester and fourth place McQuaid.

McQuaid, largely due to the play of Greater Rochester tackle Glenn Williams who has now moved on to Syracuse University.

The Irish also lost formidable halfback in Gary Fornorola who has already impressed Coach Pat Stark at the University of Rochester.

The Irish can count on the return of 6-2, 248-pound tackle Dan Mastrella, described by the State Sports Writers Association as one of the Blue Chip gridders of Western New York.

Aquinas head coach Nick Teta says Mastrella isn't as fast as Williams, but adds he is physically stronger — a terrifying thought for opponents.

Among the 25 lettermen back are seniors: halfback Vinnie Battaglia, offensive/defensive Battaglia, tackle Joe LaVigne, offensive tackle Doug Hayes, Quar-terback/defensive halfback Tim Weston, defensive/offensive halfback Alten James, halfback Ray Megerle, fullback Bill McCee and ends Matt Casale and Steve Kolmer.

Teta can also call upon juniors Larry Teta at Center, Paul Rowland at guarterback, Brian Haves and Wayne Marshall at guard, and Russ Thornton at linebacker.

This is Teta's fourth year at the helm — he's 14-9-1 through his first three seasons.

Assistant coaches include Moody Johnson (defense), Jack Lyng (offensive backs) and Ron Chiafery (line).

Missing is Frank (Hunk) Vadas, who passed away during the season last year.
