### Life, Liberty and Law

UNICEF today is heavily involved in family planning. And they do not deny it. It began in 1950. By 1967 a small allocation of \$700,000 was set aside for family planning assistance consisting of equipment, vehicles and training. Three years later the UNICEF Board of Directors approved distribution of contraceptives; and the UNICEF family planning budget in 1971 rose to \$2.4 million. By 1973 that amount had swollen almost double to \$4.2 million.

With the World Health Organization (WHO), the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), and the U.N. Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), UNICEF is a member of both the U.N. Inter-Agency Consultative Committee which is a major source of advice for the United Nations Fund for Population Activities (UNFPA), and the U.N. Executing Agencies which perform special population-control services.

In June 1974 UNICEF was among the 88 sponsoring organizations of Planned Parenthood Federation of America's International Convocation on the World Population Crisis, held at the posh Hotel Americana on Manhattan's upper east side. The goal of the convocation was to help all women—regardless of race, creed, age or income—to avoid the tragedies of unwanted pregnancies and births. Notable among other sponsors were: CARE; three separate divisions of the United Methodist Church; the Thomas A. Dooley Foundation; the League of Women Voters; Planned Parenthood Physicians; Project Hope; the YMCA; Senator Henry Jackson and Senator Edward Kennedy.

Subsequently, the official UNICEF position on abortion was released: "It is not a matter for UNICEF judgment one way or the other. Obviously, some medical equipment which UNICEF routinely supplies for health services can be used for abortions in addition to many other types of surgical interventions." This was reaffirmed July 1975.

The justification offered by UNICEF for increased family planning activity is neither unexpected nor unusual. Most pro-abortionists parrot the same formula: assistance (or facilities or equipment or salaries or research or funding etc.) is given "without judgment in a pluralistic world which recognizes no absolutes" only to those who request it; and the extent of the assistance represents only a small part of the total action. That sounds reasonable enough on the surface.

Unfortunately UNICEF views abortions, abortifacients, research, sterilizations, IUDs, their stockpile of Depo-Provera (permission granted this year by UNFPA), experimentation, and surgical as well as non-surgical contraceptives as integral parts of the comprehensive UNICEF family-social-medical health centers. A nation seeking to eliminate impure drinking water, or filth or disease or starvation is strongly urged and advised to take the whole package.

Latrines and sewerage systems are seen as family health/family planning; immunization, nutritional aid, vocational training, and education are seen as family health/family planning; maternity care, functional literacy, food production—all are described by UNICEF as "a few opportunities relating to family planning as a part of other services currently receiving assistance from UNICEF and WHO." (In UNICEF literature, the two organizations are frequently in tandem.)

WHO research into injectable, ingestible, insertable, and/or implantable contraceptives, sterilizations and abortifacient devices and methods have been documented here many times.

UNICEF has come a long way into family planning. They do not deny it. They enjoy widespread support especially through their Holloween Trick 'n Treat boxes, and their colorful Christmas cards. They do feed many children, but they systematically support and fund and encourage and cooperate in the destruction of thousands of others.

I shall list organizations which feed, clothe, cure, educate, mend, shelter, protect and love all these organizations which recognize a child for what he is—the ultimate creation of a wise and loving God.
