## School Action in Full Swing

### MCQUAID DRAMA

The theater season is opening around the world . . . London, Paris, Vienna and at McQuaid Jesuit High School.

With the return of Father William O'Malley to McQuaid's Drama Club scene the school is starting off its theatrical season with "The Detective Story" which will be presented at Our Lady of Mercy auditorium on Dec. 4, 5, 6.

The play centers around a police hunt for an illegal abortionist and as Father O'Malley declared, "It's a tough play with a lot of good parts." In fact, he chose this particular story because of its toughness, its focus on current problems and as he emphasized, "to make people think."

The male lead, Detective McCloud, will be played by McQuaid senior Dan Zabkar and according to him, "My part is

fitting. I'll just have to act a little tougher."

Accepting the star role in the play created a problem for Dan. He had been a member of the school's soccer team, but as play rehearsals and game practices conflicted he had to choose between the stage and the playing field. After much thought and talks with friends and family Dan opted for the stage and has no regrets. "It's great fun," he acknowledged.

Casting for the male roles has been completed; but auditions were held last week for the female characters. Mercy and St. Agnes students turned out in force to try their acting expertise.

It was "a spur of the moment thing" for St. Agnes seniors Mary Jo Noce, and Mary Badar. Though they haven't acted since their eighth grade days they decided it would be fun to try out.

Mercy senior Mary Ann O'Hare is no stranger to McQuaid drama or the stage. Last season she

acted in McQuaid's spring presentation of "LuLu", and spent her summer performing with Youth Theatre.

The best part of school acting projects Mary explained, "Is the getting together with everyone, and it's a rewarding thing to do."

The young actors jumped right into the business of auditioning while Father O'Malley, in true casting director form, offered advice from the sidelines "get a bobby pin for that young ladies hair, I can't see her face" "Speak louder, I can't hear you."

At times he would move in with the actors to demonstrate a particular dramatic movement required at a certain time, or the type of voice inflection needed to read lines.

Once casting is completed the play will go into rehearsals and the young actors can expect to spend 2 to 3 hours everyday after school in perfecting their parts for a professional show opening.
