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## **Rochester, Buffalo** Legionaries Convene

Batavia - "Then the Apostles went back to Jerusalem from the . . . . They Mount of Olives gathered frequently to pray as a group, together with the women, and with Mary the Mother of Jesus, and his brothers." (Acts 1:12-14)

With the reading from the Acts of the Apostles, Father William A. Trott, diocesan director of the Legion of Mary of the Rochester Diocese, opened the day-long workshop here on Sept. 20. More than 240 legionaries from the Rochester and Buffalo Dioceses came together to discuss ways and means of expanding the horizons of the Legion of Mary, and of attacking the problems that the legion faces today.

In his keynote address, Father Trott stressed that an openness to the Holy Spirit is essential for whatever good is to be ac-complished in our work. He pointed out that Mary, in all she did, was so open to the Spirit, that she might be described as "transparent" — the Holy Spirit was seen in and through her. the Spirit as to reflect Him in all we do.

Discussion of the relationship between the Legion of Mary and other Church oriented groups, such as Parish Councils, Cursillo, and Charismatic Movement, brought out the need for open discussion with other groups, to understand them more clearly, to work together more closely and to be more supportive of each other.

The type of works in which Legionaries are involved showed how much assistance they can give to the parish priest. The members go into the prisons, both at Auburn and at Attica, to provide a contact with the outside world and to bring the Christ-life to the prisoners; they search out the drug addicts and alcoholics to say "we care" – "we want to help"; they go out into the streets to visit every family that will open its door to them Perhaps the door-to-door visitation of the homes in the parish is one of the greatest contributions that the Legion can make in providing help for the priest

Although neither Bishop Joseph, L: Hogan nor Bishop Edward Head was able to attend the sessions, each sent a letter to be read to the Legionaries encouraging them in their work for the Lord

The day concluded with the The day concluded with the Fucharistic celebration. Father James, K. Crowe, diocesan director of the Legion of Mary in Buffalo, was the principal concelebrant. The general concensus was that the day was very rewarding. The members came away full of enthusiasm and fresh ideas for the future.

WINDOWS ARE ALIKE, RIGHT?

Oct. 16, 1787. Two prominent Catholics Two represented their states in the convention that formulated the American Constitution: Thomas FitzSimons of Penn-sylvania and Daniel Carroll of Maryland. Both of these signers of the Constitution thought it a good document, and urged the fellow citizens of their own states to adopt it. On Oct. 16, 1787, Daniel Carroll, in a newspaper article, exhorted Marylanders not to delay in their ratification. He admitted that there were some details of this committee-made document that he did not like. But he pointed out that there were "seeds of reformation" in the Constitution: provisions for amending it. In general, however, he was enthusiastic about it. "I am satisfied that anything nearer to perfection could not have been accomplished . . . . I am bold to assert, that it is the best form of government that has ever been offered to the world."-Rochester Diocesan Bicentennial Commission.

#### **3 Volunteers Get State Posts**




# Deaths
