The date was Nov. 22, 1963 and was in the barber's chair listening to the music on the. radio. My father and the barber were having their usual discussion about the football season. The music broke and I heard the voice of a choked up announcer say, "President announcer say, Kennedy has been shot, repeat, the President has been shot."

At first I didn't fully comprehend the meaning of this bulletin. I turned to my father and said that President Kennedy was dead.

Sen. Schweiker of Pennsylvania sponsored a resolution to reopen the JFK assassination case. This assignment would be given to the Select Committee on Intelligence Operations. Schweiker is a member of the committee, directed by Sen. Frank Church of Idaho, which is examining CIA

The Warren Commission concluded that Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone. However, there is a possibility that there was a conspiracy.

The CIA and FBI may have covered up evidence that may have affected the commission's

An Associated Press story on Sept. 9, 1963 quoted Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro as saying that U.S. leaders would be in danger if in any way they helped "eliminate Cuban leaders." CIA plots to assassinate Castro were withheld from the Warren evidence provides a motive for the murder of Kennedy.

Jack Ruby, who murdered Oswald after the killing of Kennedy, was an FBI informer. This fact was brought out under the new Freedom of Information act in a letter by the late FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, in 1964.

The FBI kept from the public, knowledge that they knew Oswald was a threat to Kennedy. This information was reported on Sept. 1 by the Houston Chronicle.

Oswald may have had "affiliation with an intelligence operation" in Russia. Being a former Marine, he was in Japan where CIA agents were trained. After applying for a "hardship" discharge he went to Russia, and renounced his citizenship. When he wanted to come back we never questioned him in any way and even paid his fare home.

There are many theories about Oswald, one that he was a double agent, another that there were several impostors claiming to be Oswald, who were a "crackshot with a gun", the same gun used in Dallas. These impostors all had an unusual likeness to Oswald except for a difference of as much as six inches in height.

The angle and rapid firing of the shots which killed the President could not be matched by the FBI's best marksmen using the same gun.

"But once we got the ball to the outside of the firld and played our own game, we did very well," Sister says.


Mercy scored four of its five goals against Marshall in the fourth quarter when Marshall just couldn't maintain the pace.
