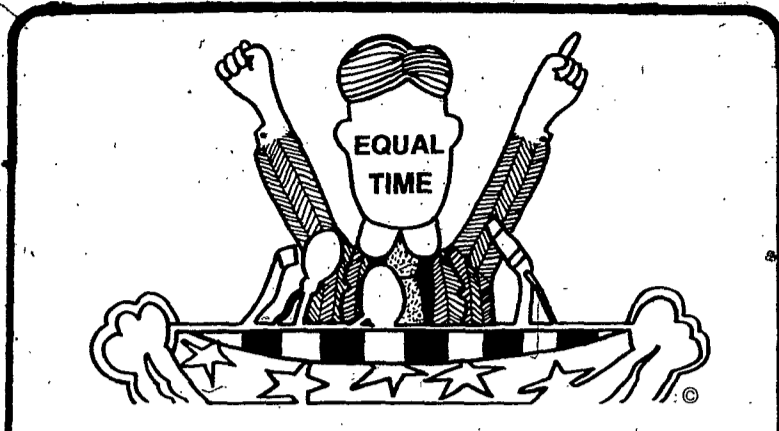

What is your opinion of the Patty Hearst story?

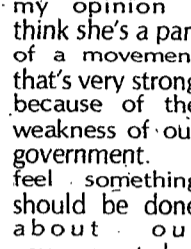
OUR LADY OF MERCY

Kathy Crowley, junior, glee club



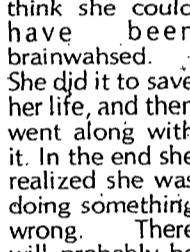

Jackie Montione, sophomore



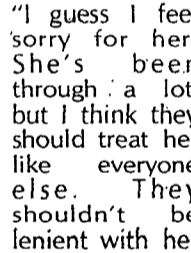

Ellen Dunn, sophomore



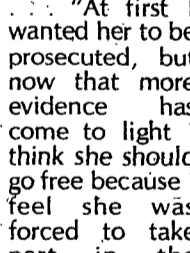

Colleges Get Kodak Awards

Under its 1975 Educational Aid Program, Eastman Kodak has made direct grants totaling \$136,750 to seven collegiate institutions in the Rochester area, the company announced last week.

Nazareth College received \$4,500 and St. John Fisher, \$24,000, the announcement said.

The amount of the direct grant to each institution is based in part on the number of its graduates who joined the company within five years of their graduation and are in their fifth year of Kodak employment. Financial aid is extended also to the Empire State Foundation of Independent Liberal Arts Colleges and similar

organizations in other states. Awards of various kinds to 275 universities and colleges across the country brought the total outlay this year to \$3.6 million, the announcement said.

It also outlined a new, competitive scholarship program for sons and daughters of Kodak employees, undertaken in cooperation with the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Renewable awards will range from \$500 to \$3,000 a year.

The Educational Aid Program, the company said, dates "from the early 1900s, when company founder George Eastman made educational contributions from his own resources."

China's Youth Ordered Moved

While here in the U.S. there is controversy over mandatory school busing, it has been reported by the New York Times that on the other side of the globe China has resettled 15,000 junior and senior high school graduates in rural areas.

This resettlement is not a new program. According to reports, more than 10 million young people or one of every 15 city residents have been sent to the countryside since the project began in 1968.

It is reportedly one of the largest organized movements of people in history, and is China's way of dealing with urban crowding and rural backwardness.

Young adults who are not resettled go to work in factories. Some are specially selected for training as artists, actors or athletes. A few manage to get into universities, but must work at least two years in factories or on farms, and then must be selected by their units.

The resettlement plan is not without its problems. The prospect of hard work in fields, away from their families has created a population of dissatisfied, exhausted, and apathetic young malcontents who escape back into the cities and a life of crime.

To combat these problems Peking is now allowing youths who have been in the countryside for several years and have been model workers to return to their cities and work in the factories.

Also, a Peking solution is to exempt single children or the youngest child in the family from relocation.

Another effort to reconcile Chinese youth with resettlement has been for party workers to accompany them and stay with them until they are resettled.

The consensus of travelers who have visited China is that the young adults tend to be accepting resettlement because there is little choice for them to do otherwise.

More than 90 colleges, employers and training schools will be represented at the second annual Career-College Night for students from Greece, Gates-Chili, and Cardinal Mooney high schools.

Juniors, seniors plus interested sophomores and parents will gather at Cardinal Mooney High School, 800 Maiden Lane, Greece Wednesday, Oct. 8, to do some post-high "shopping."

According to Father John Haycock of Cardinal Mooney, the evening offers something for all students, no matter what their future plans.

Area employers will give information on available jobs, qualifications, apprenticeships and advancement opportunities. Among the companies on hand will be Eastman Kodak, Bausch & Lomb, Delco Products, Farrel, Park Ridge Hospital, Rochester Telephone, Security Trust and Taylor Instrument.

Eight 4-year New York State

colleges and six 2-year New York agricultural-technical schools will be represented. Harvard, Yale and Boston College will lead the Ivy League contingent with Notre Dame and Valparaiso representing the Midwest.

In all, 65 colleges plus four nursing schools and General Motors Training Institute will participate.

The military services and the service academies will provide information on military careers and post-high school educational opportunities.

The evening will begin at 7:30 p.m. with two half-hour presentations by many of the participating institutions. The remainder of the evening will be open for discussion with individual representatives.
