

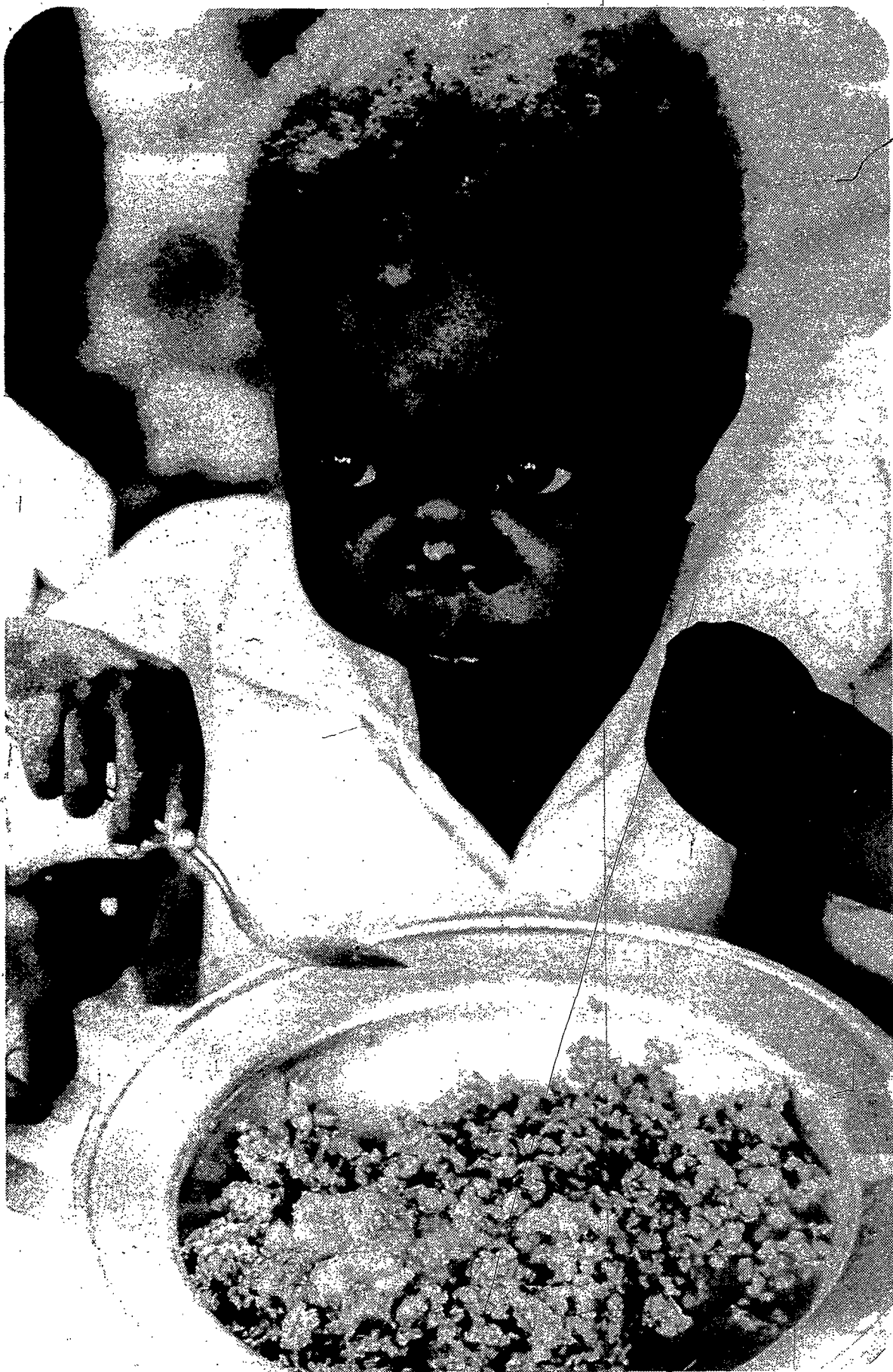

Martin Moll Named Fisher College V.P.

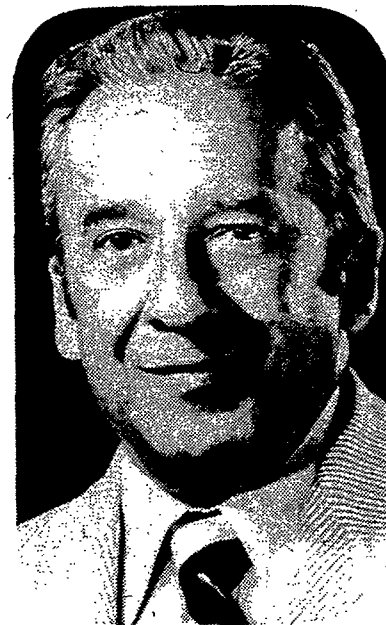
Martin Q. Moll, chairman and chief executive officer of Christopher Press, Inc., has been appointed Vice President for Development and Communications at St. John Fisher College, effective mid-November.

Announcement of the appointment was made today by Martin F. Birmingham, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and Father Charles J. Lavery, president of St. John Fisher College.

"The next decade is crucial for higher education, especially for the independent college, such as St. John Fisher," commented Father Lavery. "We must make every effort to secure and expand the foundations that have been built at Fisher during the last 25 years. We are delighted that Mr. Moll will be with us fulltime to spearhead that effort and to assist in these crucial areas of the president's office."

Moll will continue as owner and board chairman of Christopher Press, but he will not be active in the daily management of the firm. Richard F. Limpert, president of Christopher Press since January, 1975 will assume the duties of chief executive officer.
