She described her elective program now in use at St. Patrick's, in which the students take an active planning role. Her program consists of four 4-week mini-courses, each presented by an individual or team of experts in the particular field chosen for study. For example, she had a lawyer present one 4-week session on "Law and Ethics," and a priest, nurse and undertaker team worked together, each giving a different insight into the topic, "Death and Dying."

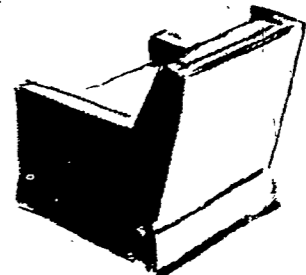

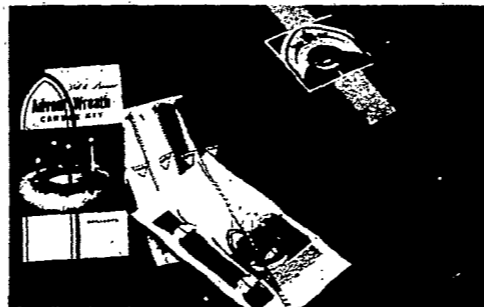
