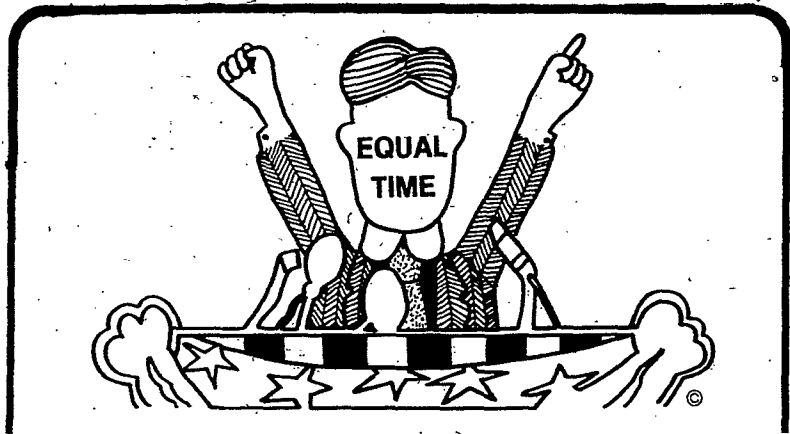

John Bower, junior, glee club
"First of all, I think the person who should be indicted is the one who gave the initial order... I mean Vice President Rockefeller. But I think the troopers should be indicted because in that way they will be proven innocent or guilty in each individual case. It's the only way to clear up the confusion. The troopers are at a disadvantage because of the feeling against them and the fact there were people killed. They are going to have to prove their innocence."

"I feel they had to act in some way. There was something wrong with the prison system — prisoners rioted for some reason. Obviously, the riot had to be stopped but like the Kent State affair they (troopers) overreacted. Even prisoners have the right to voice opinions and to protest. Of course in this case there was no question that troopers had to be sent in. But in doing their duty they overstepped their bounds."

"I'm kind of glad they are being indicted. I've heard of other cases where law enforcement officers had beat up prisoners for doing just picayune things. The troopers were ordered to keep control but not to do some of the things they did like the excessive amount of shooting. They could have kept control without using individual prisoners as examples."

"They should be indicted because they mistreated the prisoners. There should have been other conclusions. The prisoners revolted and they didn't quite know how to go about solving the riot. So, now they will have to take the consequences. Of course, you would have had to have been there to see if they overreacted, and from what I've read and seen on TV it looks as if they did overreact to the situation."

"I think they should be indicted. They were operating under orders but they still had a mind of their own to make a choice. If I were in the situation I'd follow the orders but use my own judgement as to how to carry the orders out. The troopers went a little far in carrying out their orders."

"I'm really glad to see they are being indicted because it was obvious there was a big hassle there, (Attica). I think there were things going wrong on the prisoners' side as well as on the law enforcement side like the brutality that wasn't necessary."

"I think the troopers could have done something wrong. They could have overstepped their duty in getting a little rough, and doing more shooting than what was called for."

"I think that if they were guilty they should be indicted. They shouldn't, however, be picked on. The law should not single them out, if something they did was wrong and not necessary to quell the riot then they should be prosecuted."

Magee's Return Helps Luck of the Irish

Playing is better than watching, says Aquinas fullback Bill Magee, back in action Sunday for the Little Irish against Cardinal Mooney after missing the last three games because of burns suffered from the infamous "Lime Bowl" disaster about a month ago at Holleder Stadium.

Magee, who reported for practice early last week for the first time since the burns occurred, went 57 yards on the first play from scrimmage Sunday against Cardinal Mooney, to set up teammate Ray Megerle's two yard touchdown, and ran the extra points for an early 8-0 Aquinas lead.

Although he wasn't supposed to return until the last game of the year, he turned out to be a quick healer.

He says he had a great tape job Sunday from Aquinas trainer Joe Lester and Father Frank Boehm which resulted in a 185 pound package of ointment, gauze and Ace bandages.

Magee, who had hopes of getting back into action before the season finale against unbeaten Rush-Henrietta, only played on offense; he was too tired to go both ways, admitting he was not yet back in shape.

Consider how damaging his performance might have been had he been in shape — running on offense only, he totaled 106 yards in 14 carries and didn't play any defense where he might have picked up a loose ball, intercepted a pass or even forced a Mooney fumble or two.

He ran in practice three days last week, without contact, and put the pads on Friday, two days before the game.

Against the Cards he ran all the plays except the pass patterns.

"Those straight up the middle plays really hurt," he said. "I got hit from all over and they were the most painful."

Not a single Cardinal volunteered to tackle him lightly.

Ironically, his brother Tim, a Mooney junior, should have been playing defensive end for Mooney, but he broke an ankle a few weeks ago and played the game from the Mooney bench.

"That was really all right with our mother," Bill says, "she doesn't think brothers should play against each other anyway."

The two brothers did play against each other last year, and

Magee says he hasn't heard too much from colleges, but he'd like to go to a small college like an Ivy League school or Hobart type.

Wherever he goes, his new school will get a bargain — Magee also plays baseball, basketball and likes to box.

The win gave Aquinas a 5-1 overall and 4-1 league record, good enough for second place behind front-running McQuaid.

Mooney dropped its first after five wins (3-1 in league) and fell into third place.
