





another war. Egypt is on the brink of economic collapse, and the Israeli tax rate is among the highest in the world.

It is my opinion that no one can expect a lasting peace with their current attitudes. Both sides must come to realize that further skirmishes are useless.

In addition, both the U.S. and Russia are guilty of using the area as a demonstration area of national will and diplomacy. The Egyptian economy is subsidized by Russian aid, while the United States allows Israel to buy billions in military hardware.

While we are quick to charge the Soviet Union with domination, we did not include them in the agreement. In addition, this agreement does not include Syria or the Palestinian refugees.

In theory, the U.S. will be the 'impartial umpire. American observers will be stationed with both sides. Also, we will operate on our own, six other surveillance stations. Unlike previous agreements, this one is not secret, and I hope future ones will be kept that way.
