have been deeply involved in World Hunger Month. A series of special Sunday sermons, guest lecturers and a World Hunger Workshop have given participants a clearer understanding of the problems of hunger.

On Sept. 14 Father Peter Deckman, co-pastor, introduced the program and made a special plea to meet the needs of the poor. The following Sunday Sister Mary Ann Weiland of the Office of Human Development spoke on the political planning process and what can be done in that area.

Father George Wiant, regional director of Human Development, spoke the next week on problems faced by the poor in the Newark area. On Oct. 5, Father Eugene Sweeney, co-pastor, called for a "Christian Response" to the

hunger problem. A personal pledge was made by 866 parishioners by filling out a special card as an offering to the Lord.

The program culminated on Oct. 12 with a World Hunger Workshop. Thirty participants began by watching an excerpt of a television White Paper special dealing with the plight of the American migrant farmer.

Discussions and group exercises dealing with the uneven distribution of wealth in the countries of the world were also scheduled.

The World Hunger Program at St. Michael's has resulted in the monthly food collection being "3 to 4 times larger than usual" and 586 parishioners have pledged

daily prayers for the hungry of the world.

Ninety-four people from the parish have offered their services to do whatever they can. The Human Development Committee is now organizing a program to put these volunteers to work.
