

# Cardinal Heenan Dies

London [RNS] — Cardinal John Heenan, eighth archbishop of Westminster since the restoration of the Roman Catholic hierarchy in England in 1880, died in Westminster Hospital Nov. 7 after his third heart attack in two years.

He was 70 years old and had been primate of the English Catholic Church since 1963 and cardinal since 1965. His death reduces the College of Cardinals to 120.

He was born on Jan. 26, 1905, the son of Irish Catholic parents resident in Ilford, Essex, east of London. He was educated at Stamford Hill Grammar School, a Jesuit institution in north London, and then at Ushaw College in County Durham in northeast England.

He studied for the priesthood at the English College in Rome and was ordained in 1930, in his parish church at Ilford as a priest for the Brentwood Diocese.

From 1930 to 1937, he served as curate in Barking, Essex. In 1936 he made a visit to the Soviet Union, hiding his identity as a priest and passing as a "psychologist," in order to gain first-hand knowledge of conditions there. It was at the height of one of the Stalin bloody purges.

He served as parish priest at Manor Park, East London, from

1937 to 1947. In 1940, he began a broadcasting career, making his debut on the American service station in a series, "Britain Speaks." He was appointed head of the Catholic Missionary Service in 1947 — an organization designed to "bring back the Faith to England and Wales by means of sermons in Churches and lectures in halls."

He became nationally known for his clergy retreat work, and in 1951 was consecrated bishop of Leeds. He became archbishop of Liverpool in 1957, archbishop of Westminster in 1963, and cardinal in 1965.

Following a close brush with death from an illness in 1968, Cardinal Heenan remarked, "I only hope that the real thing is as good as the trial run."

"I now have no fear of any kind of death," he said, "having seen how lovely it can be.

# Three Named at Nazareth

She taught at Our Lady of Lourdes and St. Ambrose and was the principal and local coordinator of Guardian Angels School.

Sister Jamesine has been active on various Sisters of St. Joseph congregational committees and is a member of the National Association of Women Religious and the Diocesan Pastoral Council.

Mrs. McClure attended Vassar College and the University of Vermont and finished her requirements for a bachelor's degree through the Continuing Education Program at Nazareth. She graduated magna cum laude last May, ranked second academically in her graduating class.

She is on the board of governors of the Genesee Hospital; a director and chairman of the Public Information Committee of the Monroe County, American Cancer Society; and a member of the Planning Committee of the United Community Chest of Greater Rochester. Prior to moving to Rochester she was a trustee of the Medical Center of Vermont for eight years.

Mrs. McClure is the wife of J. Warren McClure, newspaper marketing consultant and director of Gannett Co., Inc.

After graduating magna cum laude from Nazareth, Mrs. Allen accompanied her husband Mark to Cebu City in the Philippine Islands. During their stay she served for seven years as volunteer administrator to the Cebu American School, a grade school for children of businessmen working in the Philippines.

On returning to the Rochester area, she served as a career guidance assistant for Wetherings and Agnew, Inc. and later as employment manager for Rustcraft Greeting Cards in Dedham, Massachusetts.

## Fisher to Host Harrier Meet

St. John Fisher College has been chosen as the site for the 1976 National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics District 19 cross country championships. The meet, will be held on Oct. 19, 1976.

According to Phil Kahler, Fisher's associate director of athletics, this will be the first time that the district championships will be in New York State. Fisher placed second at this year's District 19 championships at Millersville, Pa. Paul Colella, the Cardinals' top runner, finished ninth to qualify for the national NAIA championships.

least 25 per cent more points on the board than last season.

Passing yardage is up 10 per cent. Rushing is up only 4 per cent. And field goal scoring is way down.

The rules were changed for the 1974 season, but apparently it took the sideline geniuses a full year to comprehend the advantages of the new rules.

The field goal scoring is down for more than one reason. Moving the goal posts back 10 yards is Numero Uno. The other change caused teams to give up possession from where it was centered if the kick were missed, and the missed field goal no longer is the equivalent of a punt. Now it's rarely tried from far out except in closing seconds or desperate situations.

Teams are throwing more, and scoring more for that reason alone. Also, bump-and-run has been reduced to one whack, freeing more receivers, and opening up more crossing patterns. (And 6-point interceptions).

Restrictions on downfield operations by the punting teams have opened up the punt-return game. More yardage. More scoring.

All the rule changes emphasized more offense, more scoring. More and more games are being won by bigger margins. Twenty-point wins are no longer rarities. The guys who invest their loved ones and deuces and fins in those weekly parlay cards that offer you about half the odds you should get, are still trying to catch up with the new scoring trends.

The bookmakers who issue straight-up "lines" against the point spreads, at legitimate odds, caught on long ago to the new trend in scoring. They used to make total points betting average around 33 points or so. Now it's up, up and away, at about 41 points per 60 minutes. Give or take an occasional overtime. Which does not count in that sophisticated gimmick betting, called "overs and unders."
