In recent weeks it you read the newspapers you probably saw the articles dealing with the Karen Ouinlan case.

For those unfamiliar with the issue, Karen Quinlan is 21 years old and has been in a coma for over six months. Her plight was brought to the attention of both the New Jersey courts and the public when her parents asked that she be taken off the respirator.

After debating between physicians, lawyers and the Quinlans, a decision has finally been made. A New Jersey judge has ruled that Karen be kept on the respirator.

In the course of the trial all the physicians, whether testifying for the State or the Quinlans, agreed on one point; if Karen ever regains conciousness the odds against against a phenomenal. recovery

Since the Quinlan case has come to the attention of the public many opinions have been

tormed on the delicate subject of eúthanasia.

In the Quinlan case many people feel that the right decision has been made. Others are in strong opposition to the verdict involving Karen Quinlan.

I am one who opposes the decision of the courts involving the prolongation of Karen's life. I honestly believe that it is senseless to extend a life where there is no hope for any type of normal recovery.

The argument may be that there is always hope. I tend to disagree. I believe that all hope has been exhausted. Mr. and Mrs. Quinlan made it known that there was no hope on their part when the request was made to take Karen off the respirator.

I fail to see the point to be proved by the prolonging of a life when those who suffer the most request otherwise. I do hope that when other cases such as this come into question the best possible decision for those closely involved is made.
