"Billy has a hereditary disease - Van Recklinghausen's disease. It manifest itself as many cafe-aulait spots (light tan in coloring and various in size) on Billy's body. This disease may show no further symptoms or it may show any or all of the following: cancer of nerve ends or spots, giantism, bone brittleness and easy breakage, slow learning (though likely not retardation), vision or hearing problems, brain tumors.

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
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
