


From China

Rochester has been making strides of its own towards better U.S. - Chinese relations. The Rochester War Memorial was the scene of a basketball game Nov. 22 between the U.S. Women's National Basketball team and the women's basketball team from the Peoples' Republic of China.

The game marked the first time that the U.S. team, composed of 15 women from all over the United States, had played together before a friendly crowd. They had last played together in the Pan American Games in Mexico where they placed first and won a gold medal.

The Chinese team played four college teams and the U.S. National Team during this recent tour. Early in the second half the U.S. team pulled ahead of the Chinese, who had led 42-34 at the half, to post a 94-82 win.

Officials for the game, Sue Peplin and Darlene May, led both teams into the War Memorial before a crowd of about 4,000, top photo. Another mismatch, also predictable. Alabama was a 21point pick, and won it 28-zip. Whoopee!

With five games on ABC in 46 hours, four games in two days, the public was overstuffed, but shortened up on quality.




