It has been one week since an efficient young man knocked on the door, drilled a hole in the family room carpet and bestowed upon us a remote control panel which at times is not unlike Aladdin's lamp. Push a button and the temperature, including the wind chill index factor, and the time, to the second, are before us. Push another button for a Madison Square event or a fairly recent movie or excellent children's fare. See what's playing in Syracuse or Buffalo or New York City. Push a button, push a button, push a button... all from the Lazy Boy Röcker on the other side of the room from the TV set.

On the first day the whole cable system was enough to blow your mind. Seven days later we have become a little more sophisticated.

For example, if I see one more frame of "The Wilby Conspiracy", a film that ran recently starring Sidney Poitier and Michael Caine, I shall split my gasket. It was one of the several movies provided without commercial interruptions via the Home Box Office service for which we pay an additional \$8 a month on top of the regular \$8 cable monthly service charge.

The HBO fee, however, in my mind has already paid for itself. On Thanksgiving Day with eight children in the house there was a two-hour pause in the chaos as all of us (with the exception of a couple of football nuts who went up stairs to view the Bills in black and white) sat down to watch a really good BBC production of "Heidi". Later in the week, our three watched another children's film about a seal, although they passed up the second episode of "David Copperfield." And I discovered "The Pallisers," the 26-parter about Victorian England taken from the novels of Anthony Trollope. In just one episode I was caught, I hook, line and historical ignorance up to my eyeballs in romantic intrigue, Victorian politics and settings and costumes so lavish as to give one cultural indigestion.

Yes, there have been conflicts but thus far each viewing segment of the family has taken his turn. I found out that early afternoon shortly after putting the kindergartner on the bus is a fine time to take a look at my favorite, the movies. Home Box Office has one at 1:30 and Channel 3 in Syracuse and Channel 11 in New York also offer films at about that time.

By the time the kids get home at 3:30 the cartoons have started. From then until supper it's a steady diet of Superman and Lone Ranger. After supper, the fellow who is paying for all of this gets a crack at the control panel.

A lot of TV you say. You're right. Undoubtedly the novelty will wear off and there are, of course, compromise measures. I could bring up the ironing board and do the shirts and when they're done resume my old exercise patterns of jogging in place before the set.

As for the kids I've never seen the TV win out yet over snow and obviously we haven't long to wait for that. In the meantime, I must rush. There's a good movie I missed in the theaters coming up at 1:30 and there's a lot of clutter to move, dishes to do, etc., before then.
