Episcopal Priest Heads Family Center Program

There's a vigorous new program growing over at Catholic Family Center — and it's headed up by an Episcopalian priest.

The program is called Marriage and Family Life Enrichment and it's coordinator is Tom (he doesn't use his clerical title) Hanson, who celebrates weekend liturgies at St. Peter's Church in Holcomb and helps out at St. Simon's in Rochester.

The idea behind the new program, which started up in June, is to educate families and individuals so that when family crises arise they are not destructive to the family unit.

"It's a preventative," Hanson says.

Working as a team, John Barnoski, Joanne Lytle, and Hanson have already introduced their program in four of the seven Rochester area Catholic high schools. They hope to expand into the remaining high schools in the next few months.

Hanson says that it's also possible the program, a course in human sexuality geared to the high school level, will be introduced into East and Franklin under their guidance.

The team, he says, also is working through regional coordinators to make presentations to parishes and parish clusters.

The object "is to help persons sharpen their understanding of their own sexuality," Hanson noted. This is done through a variety of techniques ranging from role playing through viewing film strips.

Another aspect of their duties is Marriage Communication Counseling.

"The stress is often on parenting," Hanson says. The team's approach here however addresses family growth, communication between spouses, intimacy and fulfillment.

He illustrates the need for such counselling by citing the typical crisis at the time the last child "leaves the nest" and the couple discovers that without the focal point of the child in their lives, "they are strangers to one another."

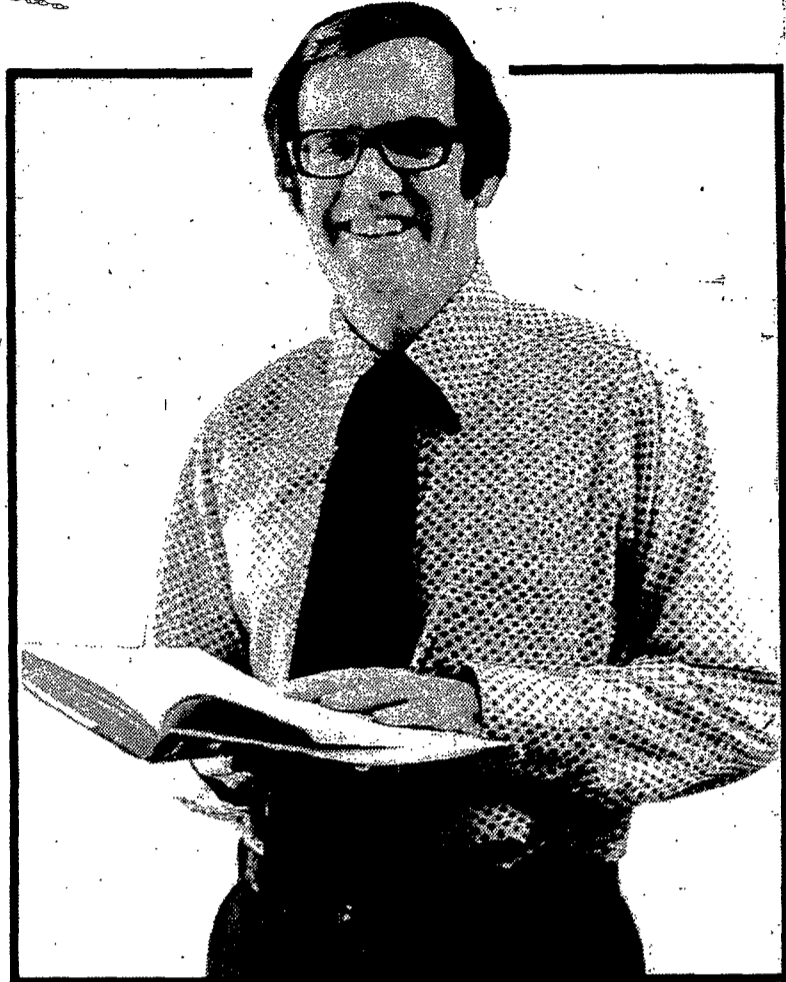
The team is working up a Lenten program which they will offer parishes in 1976. The program also explores marriage communication.

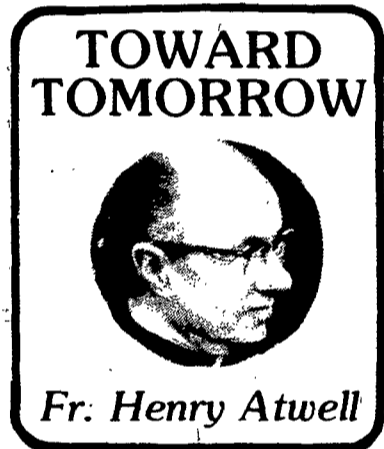
The class of eighth graders, teenagers and adults was presented to Bishop McCafferty by Father William Spilly, who, with Sister Mary Jude, instructed the group.

Two quotations from the Bible deeply impressed me when I was a child.

The first was the invitation of Jesus to his disciples, "Come, follow me." I was told one way I could especially follow Jesus was by becoming a priest, so I enrolled in the seminary.

The second statement was the petition of the disciples to Jesus, "Lord, teach us to pray." I was told one of the best ways to pray was as the church officially prays in the Divine Office as published in the Roman Breviary, so for Christmas in 1938 my Mother gave me the Latin gave me the Latin "Little Office of the Blessed Virgin Mary," a small book printed in Belgium. I used the book frequently during my days at St. Andrew's Seminary to prepare me to use the full Breviary later.

A Short Breviary using the American bishops' Confraternity of Christian Doctrine text of the New Testament was published here in America in 1941 so I purchased that volume and used it almost daily while I was a student at St. Bernard's Seminary.

Monsignor Gerald Lambert then gave me the four-volume Latin Breviary, printed in Canada, for my ordination as subdeacon in 1945. That was the year, however, when Pope Pius XII issued a new Latin translation of the Psalms to replace the translation made by St. Jerome and used in the Divine Office for fifteen hundred years. So I bought a new three volume Latin Breviary, printed in France, in 1961.

Pope Paul and the world's

Catholic bishops at the Vatican Council then authorized priests to pray the Office in English so in 1964 I purchased the Latin-English three-volume Breviary, American edition, which contained the American bishops' Confraternity of Christian Doctrine text for both New and Old Testaments of the Bible.

An "interim" one-volume Breviary was published in England in 1971 with the ecumenical Revised Standard Version text of Scriptures, except that the Psalms and Canticles were from the Grail translation, so I obtained that edition, as well as a revised edition of the 1941 Short Breviary in 1973.

Now in 1975, just a few weeks ago, I saw advertised and purchased the "wholly revised" Short Breviary which contains the American bishops' New American Bible text. This Breviary, handsomely bound and printed, costs \$8.00 and is a handy volume of daily prayer and spiritual reading.

But the American bishops have now actually banned this new Breviary because its publishers, the Benedictine monks at Collegeville, Minnesota, jumped the gun on the bishops' own four-volume Breviary which will cost ten times more — \$20 per volume or a total of \$80 for the set.

Personally, I think there are prayers and inspirational readings enough for a life time in that banned Breviary but the American bishops tell me it's a no-no. So here I am almost thirty years into my priesthood and I have acquired a veritable library of various editions of the Breviary.

Maybe I'll just go back to the little prayer book my Mother gave me for Christmas in 1938 and start all over again and ask, "Lord, teach us to pray."
