

Regents Awards -- Catholic High Schools

The Regents Scholarship list released last week by the State Education Department names 274 students in the seven Catholic high schools of the diocese. There are 158 winners of the academic awards and 104 alternates, plus 12 winners of nursing education scholarships.

The awards are based on scores achieved in a six-hour test taken Oct. 1, 1975 — the Regents Scholarship and College Qualification Test. Each is worth \$250 a year for up to five years of college-level study in New York State, or for hospital nursing programs or two-year courses in approved private business schools.

Parallel Seasons for New Coaches

People were beginning to wonder when Bishop Kearney and Franklin were going to win a basketball game under their new coaches, Doug Farrell at Kearney, and Trenton Jackson at Franklin.

Both took over head coaching jobs this season at their respective schools for the first time. Farrell succeeded Carm Urzetta at Kearney and Jackson took over for Jack Christensen at Franklin.

Both saw their teams lose their first five games.

Both were highly successful athletes when they played high school basketball, and neither is accustomed to coming up on the short end of final scores.

Farrell starred for Cardinal Mooney and Niagara University; Jackson starred for Franklin and Illinois. Both subsequently returned to Rochester to teach and coach in their home town.

Kearney lost games to Edison (83-44), Monroe (46-31), East (58-42), McQuaid (66-50) and Aquinas (84-65), before nipping Irondequoit 52-51 on Saturday, Dec. 17.

Franklin lost to Aquinas (65-50), McQuaid (75-68), Mooney (68-67), Madison (94-89) and Brighton (52-47) before beating Medina 68-56 in the consolation final of the Brockport Tournament last Tuesday.

Farrell admits his players were beginning to feel the pressure. He suggests that many of his friends and associates were looking forward to Jan. 23 when Kearney plays Franklin and the possibility that both teams and coaches would still be winless by that date.

Farrell made some changes in his lineup which he believes resulted in

the Kings' surprise win over Irondequoit in a game at Kearney.

He had 6-1 sophomore Mike Morris among his starting five against the Indians and added 6-3-1/2 junior Steve Kryk to the lineup.

The pair only scored six points between them, but constantly bottled up Irondequoit defensively.

One senior 6-1 Paul Bonachi sat the bench most of the game until the fourth quarter against Irondequoit and scored eight of his nine points in the final period, including the game-winning bucket with 17 seconds left from about 20 feet out.

Kearney, of course, is a different team without the services of Nick Urzetta, the Greater Rochester cager who is now a freshman member of the St. Bonaventure varsity.

Urzetta averaged 26.5 points per game for the Kings last year and Farrell's only alternative to fill the void is with defense — there's no way the Kings have any one (or two

or three) players to fill Urzetta's shoes.

A student of defense himself (he learned under master defensive Coach Ed Nietopski at Mooney), Farrell took his lumps when Edison hit 83, and Aquinas rolled to 84 points in their respective victories over the Kings.

Franklin gave away some big points also enroute to its first win against Medina. The Quakers saw McQuaid hit 75 and Madison 94 in losses to the Knights and Parkers, respectively.

Jackson, who's on a one-year "contract" for Christensen who took a leave of absence, has kids who want to run. The Quakers have a good performer in Mike Dennis who Jackson says is one of the smoothest guards around.

He's trying to improve a frustrating season a year ago when he averaged 11 points per game and missed a month's play because of a hairline fracture of the back. Now that the initial win is under each coach's belt, things may get better for both of them.
