## An American Study Smorgasbord

America has been known as "the melting pot" because of its absorption of so many of the world's peoples, their cultures and talents.

This international mixture has made the task of learning about American culture a difficult one. Of course the political and historical facts are in the books, but statistics don't bring a country's heritage to life.

But combine America's historical facts with its personalities, its music and its art, such as Mercy High School's American Studies Program does, and you have the result as junior Ruzica Zlatunic observed. "The entire American culture blends together."

Mercy's program now in its fifth year combines this nation's music, art, English and history into an informal educational format which allows maximum student participation.

"Our theory," explained English teacher Mrs. Jane O'Brien "is that the more the students do themselves the better they learn."

It is Mrs. O'Brien who handles the English end of the program where the students read and report on classic American literature by authors such as F. Scott Fitzgerald, and Kurt Vonnegut.

Sister Barbara Weyand has the music curriculum which involves the study and analysis of such

American composers as Charles Ives, Aaron Copeland and George Gershwin. Music also is researched from this country's first days to modern day rock.

Art is Sister Estelle Martin's area where Mercians not only learn about but view the works of American artists.

It falls to Patricia Ciarletto, American Studies instructor, to give the students the heavy data facts, dates and the structure of American government. Through the coordinated studies program, however, this factual history becomes more than just isolated learning. It generates knowledgeable awareness of the American way of living which can be applied to everyday life.

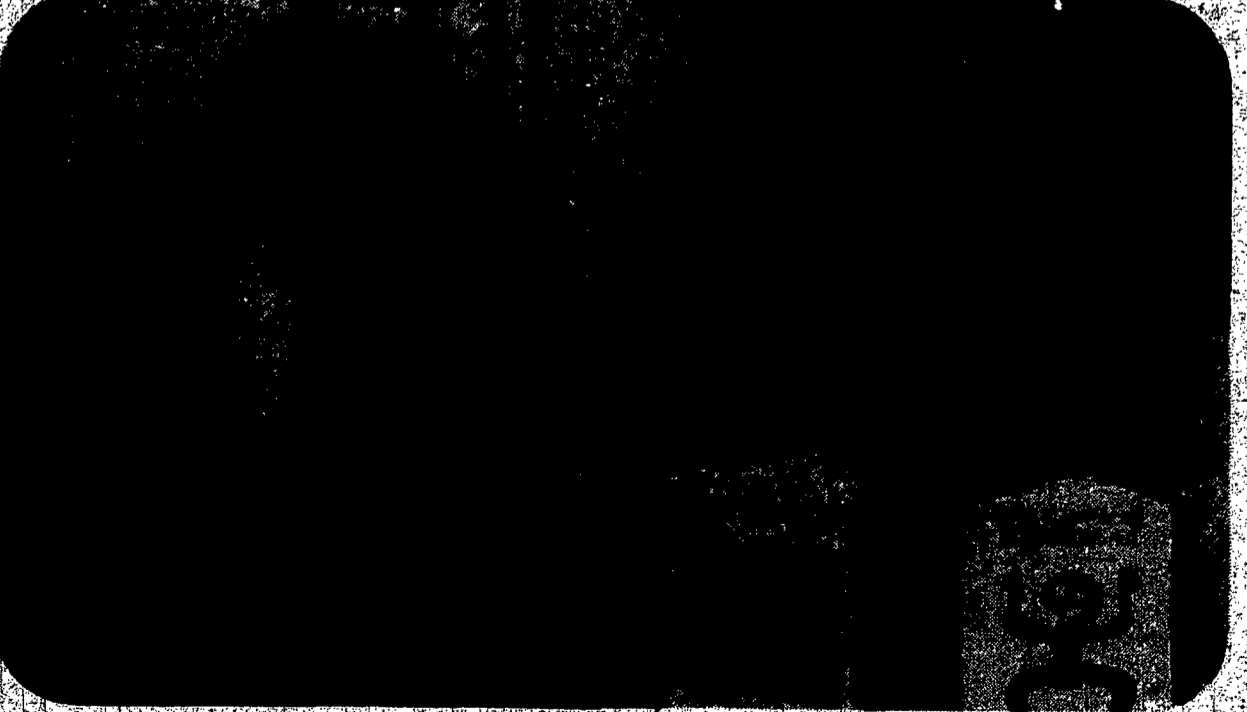
Through debates on such issues as the abolition of the Electoral College, the neutrality dilemma and the Equal Rights Amendment the students become aware of problems facing our nation.

Mercy students thoroughly enjoy this course and confided they have made interesting discoveries, one of which was voiced by Lucy DiPalermo. "We have found people then were the same as now, it's just the times which have changed."
