

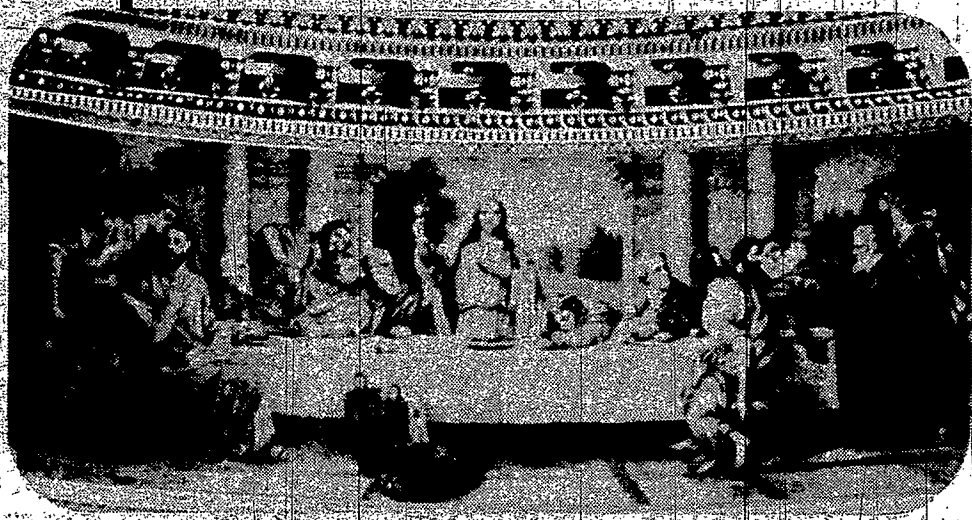

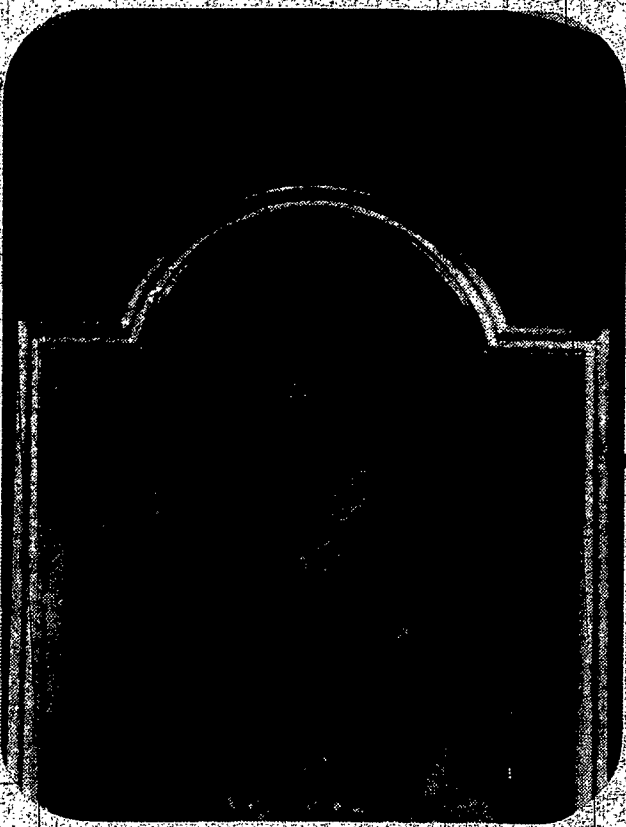
Romanesque, Gothic, and Spanish Renaissance styles, but added its own touch to each structure.

Rochester architectural talent produced the splendid St. Peter and Paul Church on West Main Street. The firm of Edwin S. Gordon and William V. Madden produced a church of tremendous detail. With gold leaf and such touches as a ceiling made of Spanish tile, the cost of building such a church today would be enormous.

To complement each church photograph, a detail of special significance has been chosen. Whether of purely historical interest, or especially appreciated by the parish, the beauty of the churches made it difficult to choose only one detail.
