## Operation Rice Bowl

"HE ONLY JUST GOT HERE-GIVE IM A CHANCE!"

Operation Rice Bowl, described briefly in last week's Courier Journal is a fine idea originated by Msgr. Robert Coll of Allentown, Pa. It will be the theme of the Lenten phase of the American Catholic Overseas Aid Appeal

Basically, ORB calls for each of us to make such sacrifices as giving up one meal a week of cutting down generally on eating so that more food will be available for those starving in our world. Of course such deprivations hardly amount to Lenten hardship and Msgr. Coll himself admits that ORB is more of an educational effort than anything else.

He, as do many in and out of religion across the world, fears the prospect of political triage—— that because food is said to be scarce hungry people will be fed first on the basis of what they can contribute Thus some will be given food and others systematically left to die.

If this sounds outlandish, consider that the foreign policy of this nation includes the assumption that we should aid those who might someday help us, or those who happen to live in strategic portions of the world and we either ignore or give taken aid to the rest regardless of the severity of need. Consider also that this basic philosophy is woven into abortion on demand and euthanasia

Thus, Magn. Coll's project is commendable if it only serves to bring the problem into clearer focus. However, it could become more than a paper tiger if we all work to put teeth into it.

If and when more food is available (if it is not already) then it is up to our government to assist organizations such as Catholic Relief Services (most faiths have such organizations and there are many secular igroups) by setting up the legal and logistic mechanics to channel food to wherever it is needed most.

We all have seen the statistics of world hunger studied the gaunt faces; been repelled by the bodies dying in the dust. Yet we have in effect turned our ears and eyes to those who talk of the necessity of the B-1 and. Trident submarines. The world may be so treacherous that we must wallow in such hot and bitter water. Still we must see to it that the qualities of justice and love are added to the cauldron or we may be facing a far sterner retribution than can be mounted in this world.

Heed Msgr. Coll's warning that 10 million persons will undergo "critical malnutrition this year while the world concentrates on military and political problems. Then wonder if this is the way it must be.
