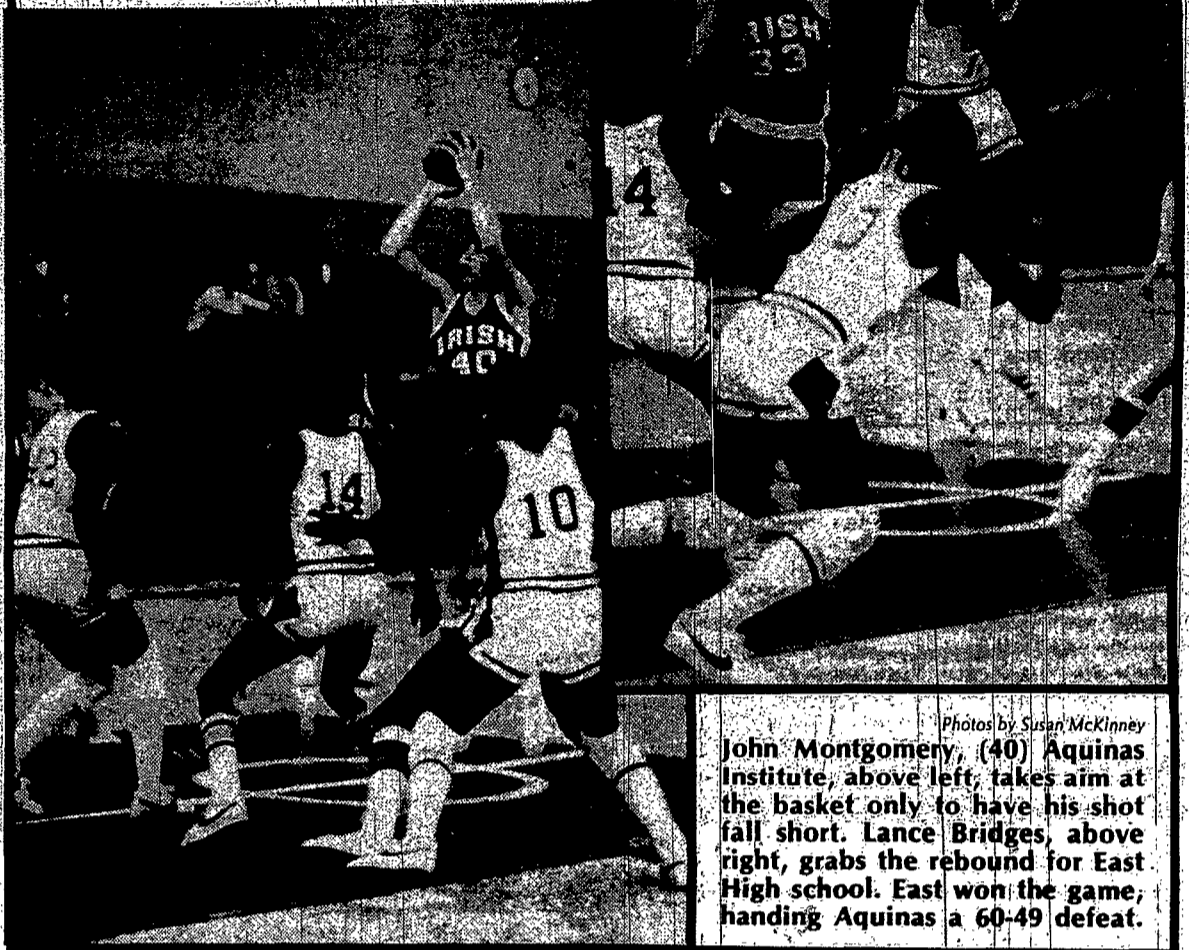

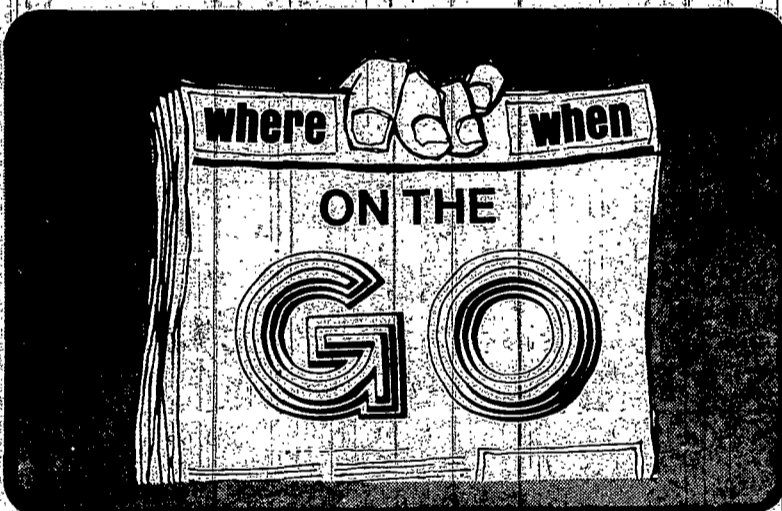
According to Brother Stoldt a total of 480 students have been accepted into the Class of 1980 at Bishop Kearney. Registration will take place on Feb. 9 and 10.
