It's All in the Line of Duty

"The race of mankind would perish did they cease to aid each other. We cannot exist without mutual help."

Community service programs are the medium through which people help their fellowman, and it's the volunteer agencies which offer the young adults a way for becoming involved in their community.

Two associations which seem to be attracting more and more of our youth are the volunteer fire and ambulance departments.

Why do high school students donate their time, usually weekend and night hours, to these organizations?

Though it was always something Aquinas senior David Lenane wanted to do, and McQuaid senior Joe Mariconda found it to be a unique experience, both boys agreed, "It's just to help people, which motivated them to volunteer for ambulance duty.

Dave and Joe are members of the Gates Volunteer Ambulance Service (GVAS). They started as dispatchers, but now having turned 18, and having completed the 65-hour Advanced Red Cross Training program along with the 9-hour Basic Life Support Course they are qualified to ride the ambulance as medics.

The few calls Dave has been out on since becoming a medic included a drug overdose emergency and to assist a person who was under severe mental stress. It was this call which made a special impression on Dave because it demanded extreme care in communicating with the person. The situation ended without incident but Dave acknowledged, "I didn't get much sleep after that call."

And it is this emotional involvement his colleagues warned him against. "It's hard at first," he stated, "but you have to learn to accept these situations."

"I want to be a regular cop," he answered when asked about his future plans and he is well on his way as he intends to take the four-year law enforcement course offered at Mercyhurst College.

There are two codes which apply to airport flight problems: code 66 which warns of an approaching plane in trouble, and code 99 which indicates a crash. These codes were responsible for some anxious moments endured by Joe Mariconda.

He was on dispatch duty one evening when a code 66 was issued. He immediately dispatched the ambulance crew and then anxiously stood by preparing to implement further disaster procedures if a code 99 suddenly came over the airwaves.

Luckily the plane landed safely, and Joe breathed a bit easier but indicated it was one of the "hairiest" nights he'd spent on duty.

An important part of volunteer duty is the mock disaster drills which coordinate the action procedures that would be needed in time of a crisis. According to Joe they underline the absolute importance of automatic obedience to authority which is so necessary in a disaster.

Joe's future plans include four years at St. Bonaventure's for a degree in Business Administration, summer courses in Criminal Justice at MCC and then a career in law enforcement.

Volunteer Fire Department readily agreed with the importance of obeying those in authority. "Drills" he explained, "are to get the necessary action into your head so you operate automatically."

Jim who is a senior at Cardinal Mooney is from a family of firemen. His grandfather was former fire chief in the Penn Yan-Dundee area. His father is a lieutenant with the WHFD and his older brother John also serves in the department. Jim, himself, has decided to become a professional fireman and has decided to take the Fire Protection and Technology course at MCC.

As a volunteer he is on call 24 hours a day. He is expected to make 20 per cent of the year's total fire calls, and attend six meetings and drill sessions a year.

Having just turned 18 Jim is a new volunteer and had his first call a few weeks ago—a false alarm which he intensely decried as a

needless danger, but one that firemen are plagued with constantly.

Jim takes his duties seriously, and the one desire of all firemen according to him is "recognition by the people." His own request is respect for the volunteers' blue light which is standard equipment on their vehicles. "Basically," he said, "it's a courtesy light, but it does help if when you see the light you would move over."

Dave, Joe and Jim aren't the only young adults involved in this type of community aid. There are others. For instance, Aquinas senior John Goosley is with the Brockport Volunteer Fire Department.

And from all reports the commitment doesn't end with high school graduation. School alumni remain very active in their volunteer organizations, like Aquinas Terry Ryan and Mooney graduate, Joe Tobin who are still with GVAS.
