Business Entrepreneurs in Action

The American system of free enterprise was on parade during the Junior Achievement Organization's Trade Fair at Midtown Plaza the week of Feb. 16-21.

Students from 37 area high schools as members of 50 business corporations were on hand to sell their respective company's products.

Expert salesmanship was the byword for the week's activities which was aptly demonstrated by Bishop Kearney sophomore and president of Simplicity Co. (sponsored by Taylor Instrument Co.) Tony DeSanctis. "Never in a million years," he barked, "will you find a buy like this."

While Tony was bartering with customers, Simplicity's vice president in charge of personnel, Mike Giordano, also a BK sophomore, outlined his officer responsibilities which included hiring and firing, responsibility for salaries, and handling all company personnel problems. He summed up his experiences in belonging to JA as "giving me a better sense to cope with the business world."

And JA achievers know their business, according to Mercy juniors Sue Hahn and Kim Cagle, who explained the organization in terms of their own enthusiastic involvement.

Both girls became interested in JA through their school's efforts to promote the program by scheduling visits by JA representatives.

Sue is in her second year with JA and is secretary of YIBCO, sponsored by R. T. French Co. Kim, also in her second year, is treasurer of Biztek, sponsored by Taylor Instrument.

All JA companies are sponsored by local businesses such as Rochester Products, WBBF Radio, Xerox, Bausch and Lomb and many others. Though employees from these companies act as advisers, the operating of these miniature corporations is entirely in the hands of the young business people.

Medal Contest Deadline Moved

The deadline for the Bicentennial medallion contest has been extended to March 22, the Rochester/Monroe County Bicentennial Office announced this week. While manning the "Kadok" booth, sponsored by Eastman Kodak, he told about the many hours he and fellow business members put in at the ironing board putting decals on their merchandise — white t-shirts. They also cut, stitched and braided leather bracelets.

Over at the "Association 76" booth, Mike Milloni, a BK sophomore, and LuAnne Aers from Eastridge were having no trouble in attracting customers. A unique meter lamp was the center of

consumer interest. Mike, who is company president and LuAnne, treasurer, were thrilled about the demand outstripping the supply and happily took orders.

"We've never been in debt," said Mike, "and we're pretty lucky. Our company has won the Company of the Month Award twice."

"It's a good company. They all work hard," declared LuAnne, and though she meant her particular business, the statement certainly applied to all the JA achievers.

Many labor hours went into the creating of the numerous products which were sold: digital thermometers, terrariums, bicentennial trays, jewelry, recipe books, magnetic bug pins, hanging planters, to name just a few.

The Trade Fair was an experience in competitive salesmanship. But more important it was a joint effort by students from private and public schools along with Rochester business to show what young adults can and do achieve — and that is the first step in meeting the challenges of the adult world.
