Not One but Six Musical Notes

The Rochester Philharmonic Youth Orchestra could very easily be named the Pegis Family String Symphony. Five of the six Pegis brothers (Chris, Jay, Joly, Gabe, and Damien) are members of the RPYO.

Young Matthew at eight years old is young yet for the orchestra, but he keeps practicing away at his violin so no doubt will join his brothers.

Joly and Gabe attend the World of Inquiry School while Chris, Jay and Damien are at McQuaid Jesuit High School as a junior, sophomore and freshman respectively.

Like the Trapp Family Singers the Pegises are musically talented. Mother and father are pianists; Damien and Gabe are violinists; Jay, Chris and Joly are the cellists.

Chris began his music career with the Eastman School of Music in the third grade while Jay started lessons in second grade. Two hours a day practice is the rule for the boys and then on Sunday it's off to a four-hour session with the RPYO under the direction of Howard Weiss.

RapAround talked with Chris just before his scheduled solo with the RPYO in February. According to Chris, every young member has an opportunity to perform a solo with the orchestra and he was excited about his performance.

"I'll be nervous before," he said, "but once on stage I'll be like an automatic pilot and play by instinct."

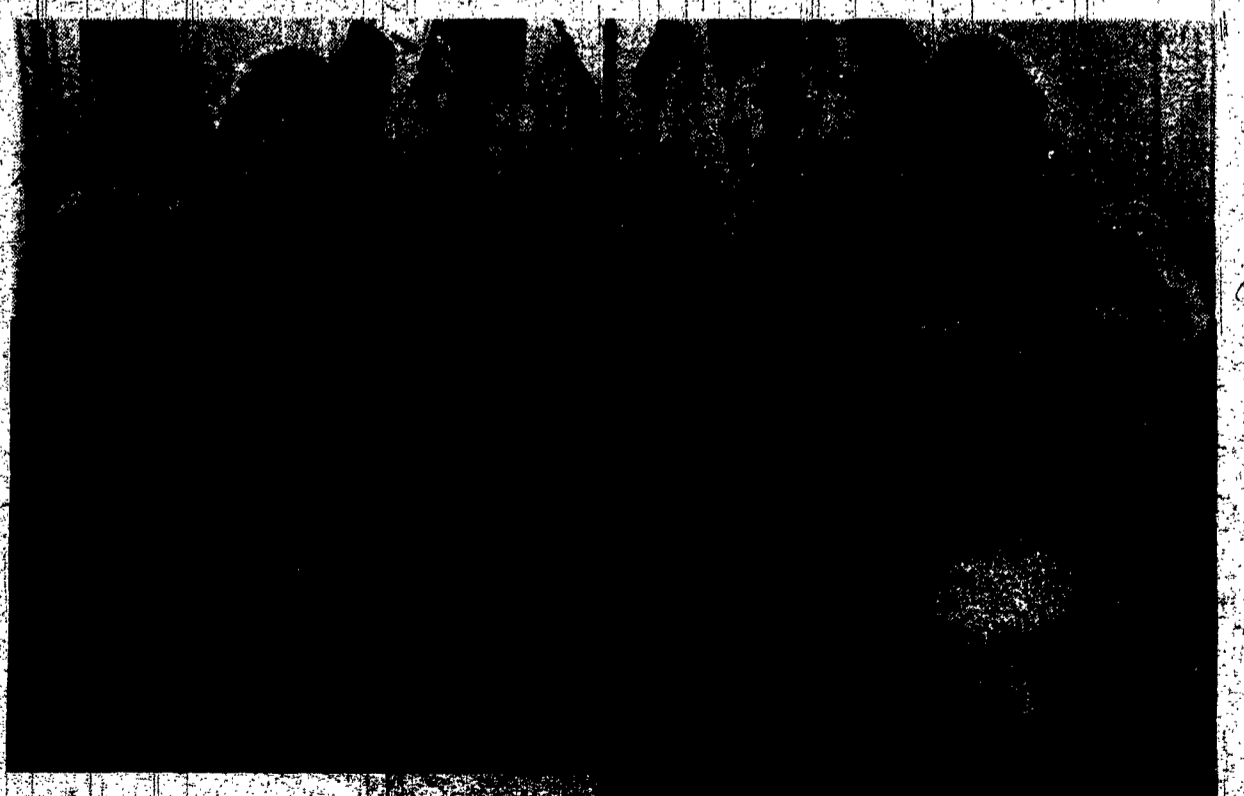
Soloing is the ultimate goal for both Chris and Jay. Chris prefers to perform music and so does Jay except he leans toward the teaching aspects of the profession.

Regarding their choice of music as a career, Chris observed, "It's one of the oddest professions you can get into," and he explained, "all you see is what's on the page. You pound out the notes and then go home."

Jay commented, "It's a demanding profession but it is also a very rewarding one."

The young musicians find themselves critical when they attend concerts as listeners. It becomes second nature to them to critique the performance especially if they have played the selections.

Besides their involvement in music Chris and Jay are enthusiastic sailors. They race and sail their 15 1/2 foot Snipe out of the Newport Yacht Club on Irondequoit Bay. Just as their music is a family affair so is sailing. Chris and Jay will spend their leisure summer hours teaching their younger brothers the art of handling a sailboat.
