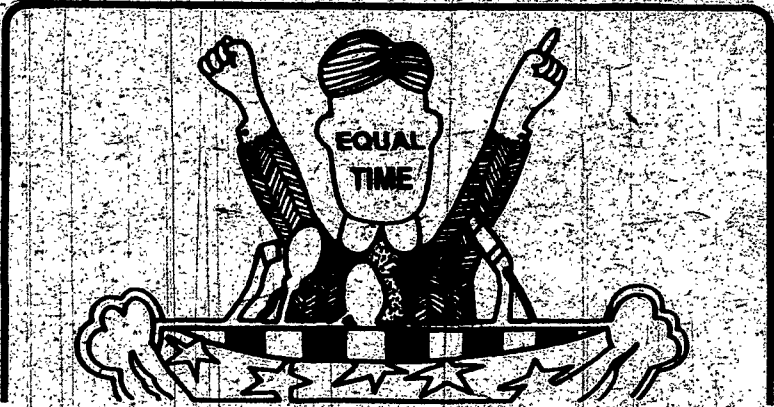

The Aquinas Performing Arts Club needs girls to participate in its spring musical. Anyone interested should see Father Leonard Cullen at Aquinas on any day after school.

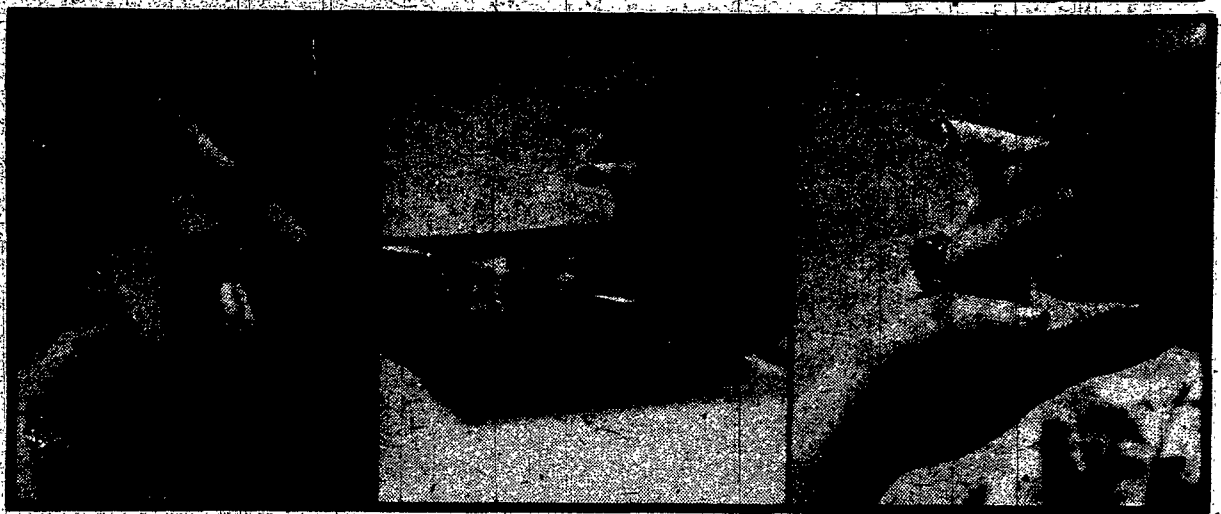

Cigarette smoking has increased among teen age girls in the last six years, with 27 per cent of girls 13 through 17 now smoking and 4 in 10 smokers using at least one pack a day. According to a recent survey, there are now 500,000 more teen-age smokers than in 1969. During the same period smoking by boys has stayed constant.

## Teen-age Smoking on Increase

The Surgeon General has determined that cigarette smoking is dangerous to your health.

This has been a visible warning on all cigarette packs for several years but by all indications it has been ignored especially by teenagers and by girls in particular.

A recent article in the New York Times reported on a survey conducted for the American Cancer Society. The grim statistics revealed that cigarette smoking has increased substantially among teen-age girls in the last six years with 27 per cent of girls 13 through 17 years old now smoking and 4 in 10 smokers using at least one pack a day.

Through the interviews conducted by the Uankelovich, Skelly & White public opinion research organization many reasons surface for the increase. Though the majority of girls interviewed knew

that smoking was harmful the knowledge was counterbalanced by their belief that most influential people smoke; that schools permitted special "smoker" rooms; doctors had never warned them against smoking.

New youth values also were cited as contributing to the increase in smoking. Their rejection of authority, emphasis on the emotional rather than the rational and an accent on self all make it easier for young people to resist arguments against smoking.

The report indicated that most schools' antismoking education programs start too late. It was reported that six of every 10 girls started smoking before age 13 and had not attended antismoking classes until seventh grade or later.

The Times reported Dr. Benjamin F. Byrd, president of the American Cancer Society, called the new

findings "alarming" and said the Society would seek ways to deal with this "urgent public health crisis."

Plans include the urging of broadcasters to run more antismoking spot announcements and to call upon regulatory agencies to stop tobacco companies from linking cigarettes to "health, beauty, physical well-being and sex" through their advertisements.

The Society also hopes to encourage doctors to talk to patients about the hazard of smoking.

Attempts are being considered to incorporate smoking education into public television through the heavy scheduling of cartoon programs.

As the Cancer Society already advocates a ban on smoking in all public buildings and transport systems it is suggesting a complete ban on smoking in schools.

### Drummer Contest Scheduled

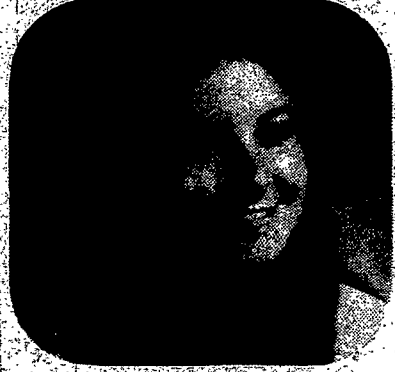
The semifinal competitions for the Bicentennial Drummer title will be held on March 13. Applications are due by Friday, March 5.
