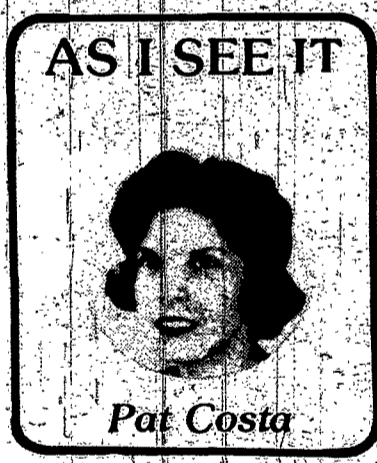

Twisting the channel selector

Finally caught a segment of "Joe Forrester," another in the many Joseph Wambaugh-inspired cops 'n robbers series that have been perpetrated upon TV audiences. Just one from the pen of the prolific police officer turned writer and TV scenarist may have been enough.

Just how many times is the same theme good — i.e. dedicated policeman whose devotion to his calling ultimately causes his wife and family to leave him. The agency to whom he devotes his life eventually sloughs him off to an early sterile retirement or turns on him in some other manner, leaving him a top candidate for suicide.

Lloyd Bridges is fine in the title role but the episode I saw had so much action and so many plots and subplots that what finally emerged had a definite patchwork quality.

Have written about "60 Minutes" so many times in this space that I

sometimes feel like a public relations employe for the CBS product. But with the addition of Dan Rather to the already competent and most compatible team of Mike Wallace and Morley Safer, the quality of the news oriented hour has risen even more, if that's possible.

Must confess I'm tired of the two pundits, Jack Kilpatrick and Shara Alexander, whose "debates" are more tedious than anything else, but the rest of the show remains stimulating, entertaining and usually on top of current events.

On a recent Sunday the talented crew presented a mild expose of the sensational weekly tabloid, the National Enquirer, proving that the paper is filled with distortions, exaggerations and outright lies. A second feature dealt with the inequitable rate of income tax for married people versus singles and the solution for some couples: divorce at the end of the year, remarriage at the beginning of the next year. And finally there was an intriguing look at the political phenomenon, the ascetic Jerry Brown of California who is following in his father's footsteps

but leaving a decided imprint all his own.

Cable TV subscribers who have the feature Home Box Office, a channel which primarily brings movies and special sporting events, have been heard to be something less than satisfied in recent months pointing out that commercial TV films were better than those they were paying the additional \$8 a month for. March fare seems to have improved. "Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore," "The Way We Were," "Chinatown" and "Orient Express" to name just four, are scheduled. All are at least a year old but if viewers didn't see them in the theater, just one viewing of a single movie by a husband and wife pays for the whole month's shot.
