**Tompkins R-T-L Seeks New Members**

Ithaca — The 1976 membership drive for Tompkins County Right to Life has been announced by John Kovach, acting chairman, at a meeting March 3.

John Arena, director of Organization and Development for the State Right to Life Committee spoke on simple steps for pro-life action, and the working details for effective R.T.L. organizations.

Imogene Calogero, secretary of the State Right to Life, editor of the State Newsletter, and a member of the Tompkins County R.T.L. gave a Wilkie Slide Presentation on "Abortion: Why We are Here Tonight."

"Since this is a meeting to promote new membership, it is a good time to draw in more regional representation from the county. We

have had good response from organized religious groups, Baptist and Church of Latter-Day Saints in particular, and we hope that Catholics from outlying regions also will come," Kovach said.

Part of the National Catholic Bishops' Plan for pro-life activities outlines a broad public information and education effort especially aimed at Catholics, and a network of diocesan pro-life committees to work with Right to Life groups.

"The Right to Life movement is booming, and the Catholic Bishops are a valuable ally, but unless each of us personally decides that this work is worth our time, life will not be protected in Tompkins County, or anywhere else in this country," Kovach added.

**Margaret Dollard Dies; Aunt of Bishop Hogan**

The Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated for Margaret Hogan Dollard last Thursday in Brockport's Church of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

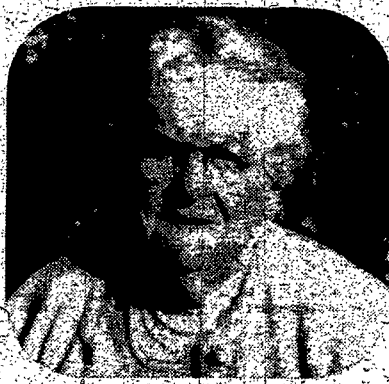
Mrs. Dollard, widow of Philip Dollard of Hamlin, died March 13, 1976, in her 97th year. She was an aunt of Bishop Joseph L. Hogan and Father Michael Hogan.

They celebrated the funeral Mass with Monsignors James C. McAniff and Edward Lintz and Fathers John Philipps, Michael Conboy and Charles Bennett.

In his homily, Bishop Hogan described his aunt as "a woman of strong faith... an alleluia person, a keen commentator on the passing scene."

Mrs. Dollard was born in Lima, the oldest of eight children. Her husband's family was in the first group of Irish immigrants to settle in Hamlin, in 1850.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Marie McGrath, and three sons, Francis, Vincent and Eugene; 12 grandchildren and six great grandchildren; two brothers, John and Francis Hogan, and several nieces and nephews.
