AS I SEE IT

I have finally found something good to say about the ABC Saturday night entry, "Almost Anything Goes." Had it not flashed upon the screen in all of its inanity on a recent Saturday night I might not have stalked out the room and escaped to the bedroom and turned on Channel 21.

But since it did, I happened upon the ninth episode of "The Adams Chronicle" which dealt with the presidency of John Quincy Adams starring the redoubtable William Daniels as our sixth president.

And I must confess I found it even better than the first episode in which John Adams came courting his Abigail. Undoubtedly the lead actor had something to do with this for I am definitely partial to Daniels of the steely eyes and clipped speech.

Moviegoers will remember him as the patriarch of the Adams family in the musical "1776," which was being shown in theaters a couple of years ago and which I fervently hope will be given another go-around this bicentennial year.

George Grizzard, who plays the senior Adams in the TV series, may be a fine actor but he does not have the commanding presence of Daniels. But let's face it, who does?

In the ninth episode John Quincy was shown having a tough time in office dealing with the Jacksonians and the states rights advocates whom he alienated with his program for a strong central government. His selection of Henry Clay as secretary of state also made him unpopular.

But the main interest generated, in the TV entry, at least, came from his personal life. His wife, Louisa

Catherine, the only First Lady to be born in Europe, was effectively portrayed by Pamela Peyton-Wright. A woman whose depressions frequently got the best of her and made John Quincy's existence a rough one at times, she too was the target of his enemies. His sons, of varying temperaments, gave him pride and pain.

Included in this segment was the death of old John Adams before which he utters the famous line "Jefferson still lives" not knowing that the third president had expired just hours before him on the same July 4.

If "the Adams Chronicle" is repeated, as all good things are on Channel 21, plan to see the entire series. I do.

Two new situation comedies recently unveiled by NBC and ABC featuring Danny Thomas and Carl Reiner must make some viewers wonder why these two veterans don't stay home and rest on their laurels or at least stay in the background and let their ambitious offspring carry the ball.

Reiner plays an angel in street clothes who goes about rewarding people for good deeds. In the first he rewards Rob Reiner, an expectant father with a chance for a baseball career, when the young man gets up in the middle of the night to satisfy one of the food cravings of his wife. The second had him bringing Loretta Swit and Clu Gallagher together in a love match after Swit helps a stranger complete a telephone call. I don't plan on seeing the third episode.

Thomas is cast as a doctor in poor section of Manhattan. (I thought "Doc" had already explored that theme) and in the episode I saw must beseech his Park Avenue medico son to give him money after his office is torn apart by burglars. Dena Dietrich (Mother Nature) co-stars in this thankless tripe.
