ND Season's Over ... Sadly

The basketball season has officially ended at Notre Dame of Elmira, but unfortunately not on a winning note.

While the Crusaders won their first Section 4, Class A title ever by defeating Sidney, 60-58, ND lost an inter-sectional playoff the following week to Section 3, Class B champion Clinton, 71-69, at the Onondaga War Memorial.

The regional loss to Clinton didn't really take the gloss off ND's season. The Crusaders finished the regular season with an 18-4 record including the Bi-State championship of the Sullivan Trail Conference.

Perhaps the proudest of all was Sister Mary Walter, Notre Dame principal, who explains that the Crusaders were seeded first in the Section 4, Class A tournament.

Notre Dame kept it close against Clinton which was considered the underdog going into the game.

Three Crusaders hit double figures for ND, but it wasn't enough. Tom Vetter scored 22 points, Rich Long hit 19 and Lacey Fulmer threw in 14.

In the other half of the Onondaga War Memorial regional twinbill, Section 3, Class A champion Syracuse CBA downed

previously unbeaten Union-Endicott, 56-51, the loss ruining the hopes of an unbeaten season for the Section 4, Class AA winners.

The game ND coach Mike Johnson will prefer to remember is the Crusaders' win over Sidney, which Bill Nichols won with a game-winning basket at the buzzer.

Nichols' two-pointer sent the partisan ND crowd into a frenzy at the Binghamton State gymnasium and hit the nets only seconds after he and Fulmer teamed on a half-court steal from Sidney's Rich Morbito.

Fulmer was guilty of the actual theft and passed the ball to Nichols who dropped in the bucket on the dead run.

Elmira Sunday Telegram Sportswriter Mark Fleisher says the game was a typical Notre Dame victory for a team that had so many "nail-biting, heart-stopping wins" through the regular season.

Johnson credits the fact that ND experienced a number of one and two point games during the season for producing the discipline and defense required to hold off and turn back Sidney.

Obviously, some of that was missing when ND went against Clinton.

The fact ND was in the sectional

finals created a positive attitude throughout the school during the week prior to the game.

Johnson notes that while Notre Dame has produced many fine athletic teams, none ever managed to win a championship in sectional or the old Diocesan tournaments before.

He had visions of Nichols, his 6-1 junior, having a big night, and the youngster wasn't a disappointment.

Nichols finished with 22 points for game scoring honors, scoring 12 of his output in the second period when ND coasted to a 38-34 halftime lead after trailing, 19-17, after the opening round.

In the opening three minutes of the third period ND outscored Sidney, 10-4, and moved out to a 10-point edge at the beginning of the final period.

Sidney pecked away and tied the score at 54-54, but Vetter and Fulmer put ND up by four with 2:42 left in the game.

Sidney tied the score again at 58-58 with 1:53 remaining, but the final dramatic points were already scheduled as Sidney's Morbito moved downcourt, closer and closer to the waiting Lacey Fulmer.

For the record, ND fired 26-for-45 from the field while Sidney cashed in on only 25 of 59.

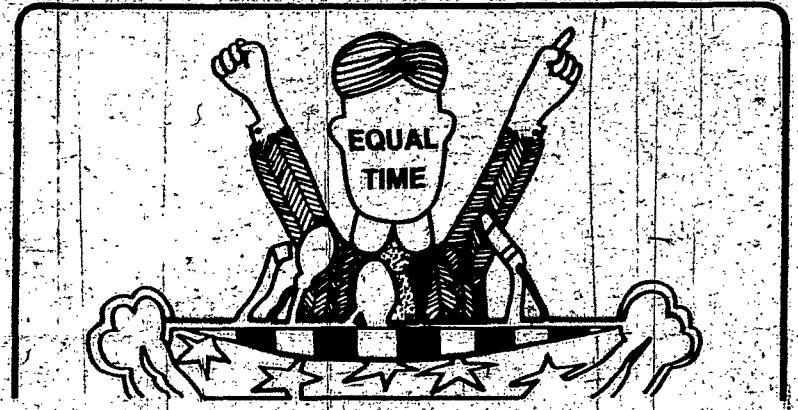

Chris Hoffman, freshman, soccer



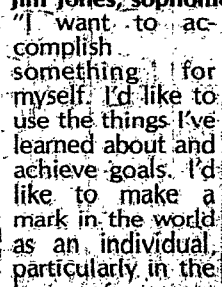
"I would try to get around the world and see as much as I could. I would also like to see everyone in the world getting along. My one wish would be to have everything perfect."

Bob Lenzo, junior, weightlifting



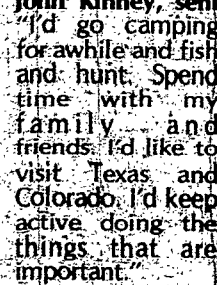
"I'd surely become more religious and stay active. I'd visit my relatives in Sicily. I'd make out a will and try to become friendly with my enemies and settle all my arguments."

Dan Kleim, senior, football

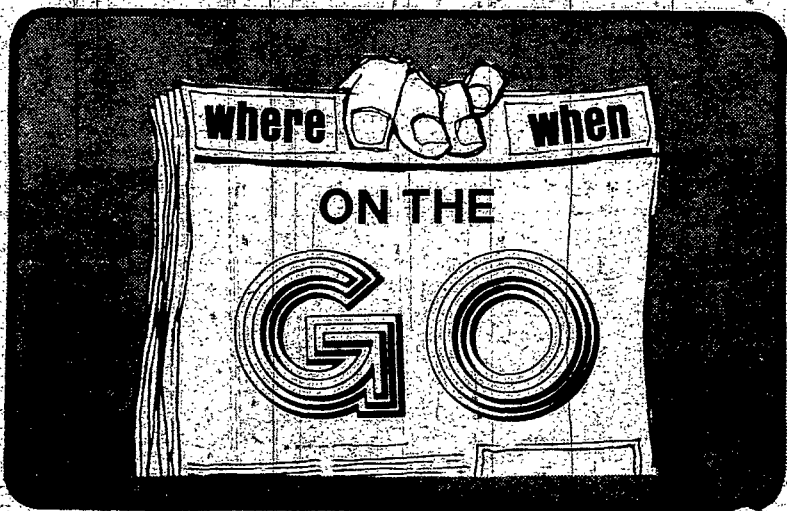
