Appointed

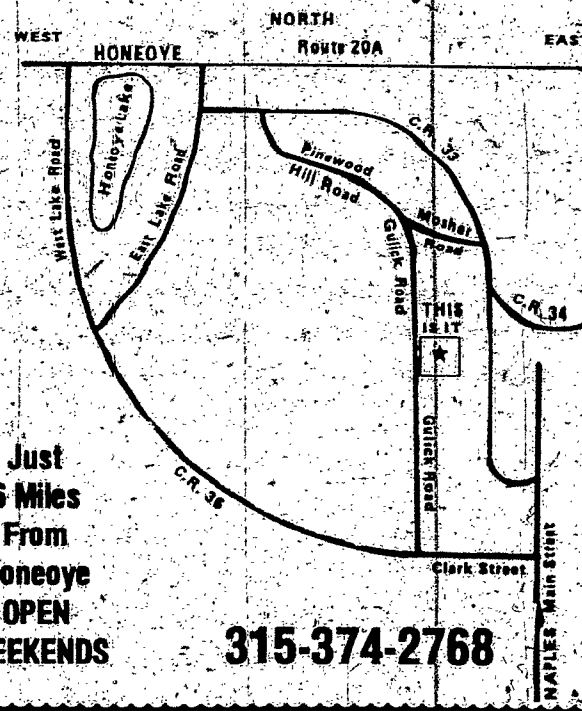
