Father DiGiacomo is chairman of religious studies at Fordham

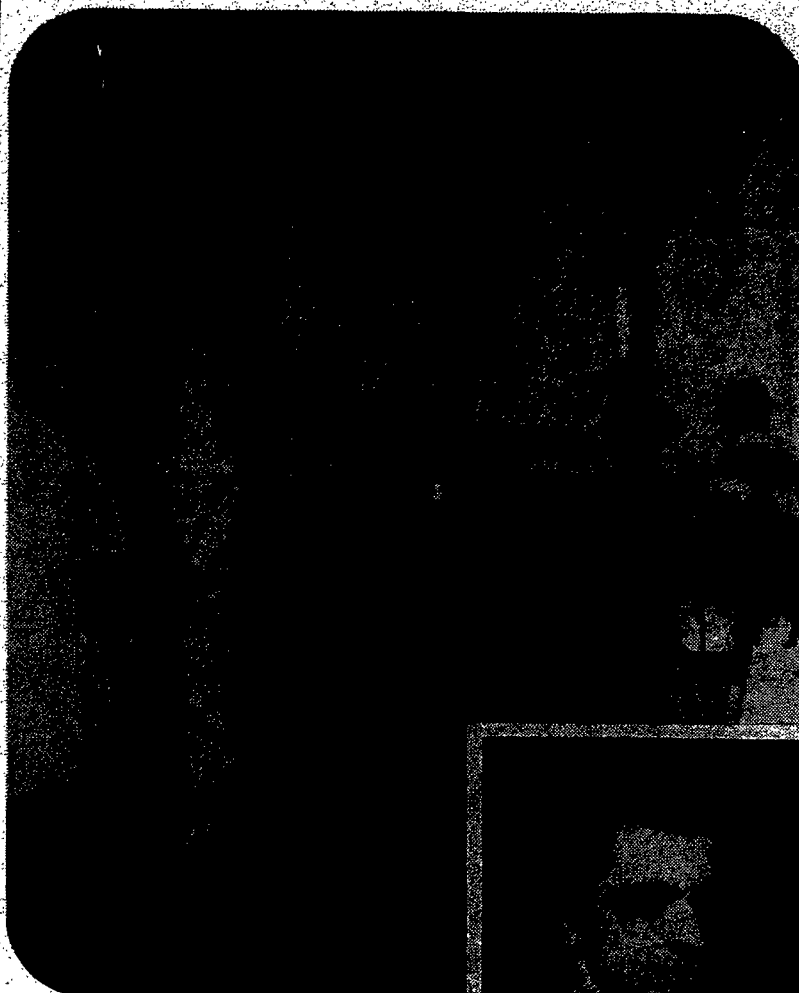

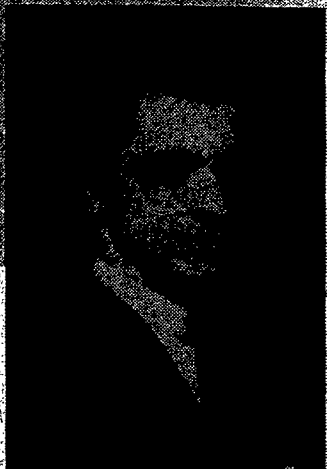

Hopscoching The Sports Beat: Muhammad Ali is matched with a Japanese wrestler who claims to be world champion. If it's on the level, Ali doesn't have much chance of winning, because once he's off his feet, he's a loser. Besides, Ali doesn't have the dynamite to take out an opponent with one punch. For what they'll be charging in closed circuit theaters, it had better be on the level. Joe Louis tried wrestling, sadly, when he was 42 years old, and that was 20 years ago. I saw him work in a dismal hall in Daytona Beach, and it was tragic. But he was working as a wrestler against wrestlers, not boxer vs. wrestler, as in the case of Ali vs. Toni Inoki.

Odds Without Ends: Critics who have seen both National Basketball Association and American Basketball Association action claim the Denver Nuggets of the ABA would be no worse than "pick'em" in a series against the Boston Celtics or the defending NBA champion Golden State Warriors.
