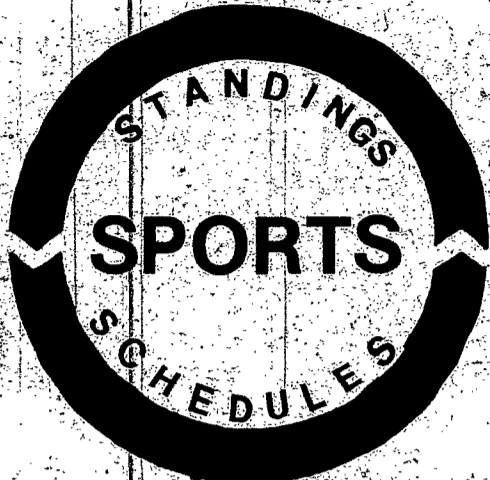

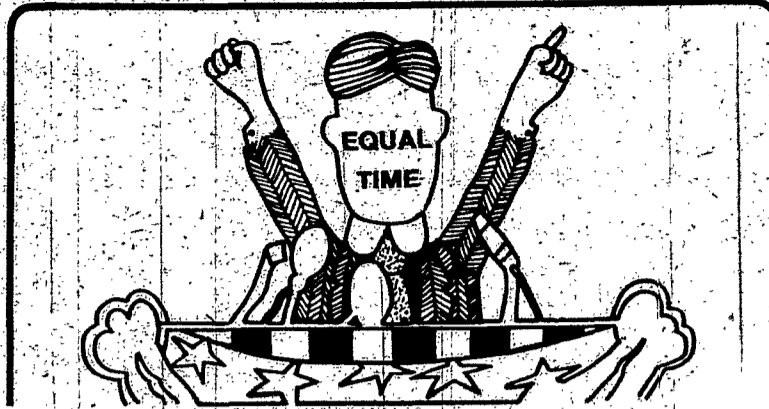

Bob Burke, freshman, football

"I think the bicentennial celebration is good for the American people because it is getting their spirit up like it was during World War II so, I'm in favor of the celebration. Some businesses are taking advantage of the celebration. Instead of trying to make money we should try to fix up the country's problems. I think too much money is being spent on the commercial side instead of being used to solve problems."

There's really no worthwhile project involved with the celebrations unless there are things which promote for environmental purposes."



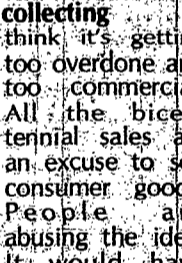
George Falcon, freshman, track

Teacher Honored

Nazareth Academy has nominated Sister Anna de Sales Smead for the Ruth E. Wasley Distinguished Teacher Award. This award is given by the State Association of Foreign Language Teachers in recognition of a language teacher who has spent many years in the classroom.

Sister's "many years" total 60 and her students today still love her and praise her excellent teaching. "I did not enter to teach, but to do as I was told — and I was told to teach," she says with a smile. And she is still teaching and still loving every minute of it!

She earned her B.A. in Latin and Greek at Canisius, where she also studied Spanish, and obtained her M.A. in German from St. Bonaventure University.

Her teaching career took her to four elementary schools — Our Lady of Perpetual Help; St. Mary's Candaigua; St. Peter and Paul's, Elmira, where she served as principal, and St. Ambrose where she taught the school's first graduating class. On the secondary school level Sister taught at De Sales where she found herself teaching the youngsters of her former schoolmates; Aquinas where she taught religion and Latin to boys, and for 25 years at Nazareth Academy where she taught Religion and Social Studies in addition to the Latin she still teaches today.
