Students Awarded Kodak Scholarships

Two Rochester Catholic high school students have won Eastman Kodak merit scholarships under a new program undertaken by Kodak in cooperation with the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

Anne V. Wolff, 16, a senior at Our Lady of Mercy High School, and Philip G. O'Loane, 18, a senior at Aquinas Institute, are among 30 Kodak scholarship winners who have earned awards ranging from \$500 to \$3,000 annually.

Miss Wolff plans to major in French at Nazareth College of Rochester. She has been involved with the Christian Action Movement, helping organize food collections for the needy. She has concentrated on French, Glee Club and library volunteer work. Her father is employed at Kodak Apparatus Division.

O'Loane plans to study medicine at University of Notre Dame. He has studied several musical instruments and has participated in gymnastics, swimming, football, softball and hockey. Also, he has earned money as a vending at-

tendant and as a newspaperboy. His father is employed at the Kodak Research Laboratories.

This new Kodak scholarship program is administered in cooperation with the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). Kodak scholarships are renewable and provide each winner with funds for four years of full-time study or until completion of a bachelor's degree, whichever comes first.

Among this year's scholarship winners are 19 students attending 12 Rochester area high schools, who are the children of active, retired or deceased former employees of Kodak Rochester divisions.

Certificates will be presented at gatherings honoring the academic achievements of Eastman Kodak Company Merit Scholarship recipients. Walter A. Fallon, Kodak president and chief executive officer, and Frederic S. Welsh, vice president, corporate relations, will host a luncheon on Wednesday, April 14, at the Kodak Marketing Education Center for Rochester area recipients and their parents.

Checking the Odds With Jimmy the Greek

Jimmy "The Greek" Snyder, popularly known as the Wizard of Odds, was in Rochester last week to speak to the Rochester Professional Salesmen's Association at the Mapledale Party House.

With Snyder was NFL official Tony Viteri who says grid referees may start wearing protective helmets under their hats this season because of bottle-throwing incidents last year.

Snyder, whose syndicated columns appear in hundreds of U.S. newspapers, wouldn't mention his annual salary from such writings, but he did say he's paid Uncle Sam more than \$2.5 million in taxes during his career.

He was interviewed on subjects ranging from the current presidential primaries to this fall's best bets for the World Series.

He considers Senator Hubert Humphrey a darkhorse contender for the Democratic presidential nomination for president and is confident the GOP will go with President Ford.

He hedged on picking a winner between Humphrey and Ford however, he says they're so much alike they even dress alike.

When it comes to the World Series, he prefers to work his way up through the divisions.

He picks Cincinnati against the Phillies in the National League and Baltimore against Kansas City in the American League.

"From then on, we'll wait, and give me a call after the division playoffs and we'll talk about the World Series," he says.

In the NBA playoffs he says he has to favor Boston, giving the Celtics the edge over Golden State.

Viteri says most NFL officials just hope they don't get hit with anything that's thrown on to the field.

"The fellow who got bit in the Minnesota-Dallas game, thank God, didn't get hurt, but there's a lot of talk about our wearing a protector under our white caps just in case something is thrown on to the field," Viteri explains.

As far as game officials controlling throwing of bottles and other things, Viteri says it's the obligation of the home club to take care of it.

"I'm sure the fellow who threw the bottle must have had a few drinks too many and that's probably the only reason why he did such a thing," Viteri says.

Drinking isn't one of The Greek's vices; he says he drinks very little and doesn't smoke at all.

You won't catch him throwing bottles from the stands, but local wagers might be affected by a curve or two he may throw in his column.

He says his percentage is 100 per cent; he says he's never wrong. Here's why.

"I just make the numbers; I never pick the winner; the bettors pick the winner. They're the ones who are wrong."

He says people never remember

the situations where he projects the correct numbers. He says he's been wrong on only two of ten Super Bowls, but people only remember those two; they forget the other eight.

He admits he receives more publicity for being wrong than for being correct.

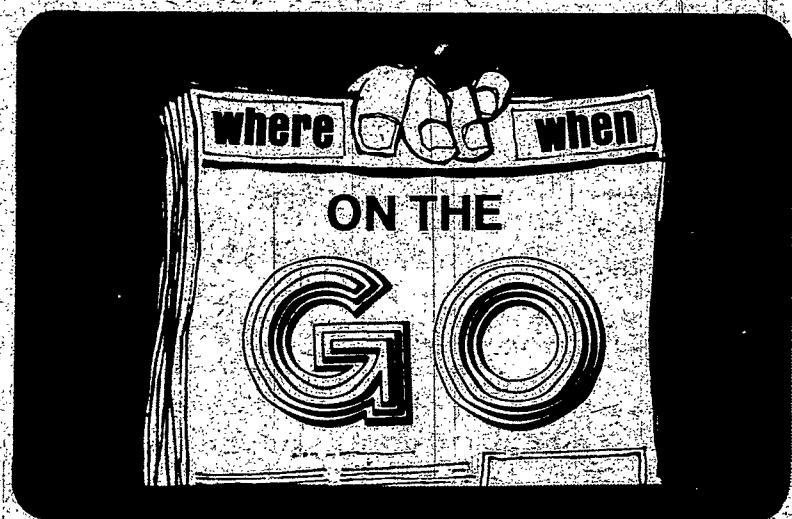
He will go out on a limb in fact looking ahead to next year's Super Bowl, he likes Oakland over Pittsburgh.
