Over 50 . . . But Still Buzzing

Mosquitoes are objective; they attack men (and women) of all races, creeds and colors.

Almost a year ago 10 runners, over 50 years of age, staged a 24-hour relay at RIT, which in their judgment, set a world's record — mostly because it had never been achieved by men their age before!

Three of the ten have vivid memories of their experience — Don McNally, Paul Robertson and Len Lockwood.

McNally, 55, doesn't know whether the race affected his life or not, but he does classify it as one of his life's most interesting experiences.

He says the race gave his ego a lift because of the hard work involved and accomplishing such a goal is very pleasing to the individual.

"I was out there with nine other men for 24 hours; you get to know nine other fellows better than you did before. I know how they feel and how they respond at 4 a.m. in the morning," McNally explains.

Robertson, 56, says he doesn't see how in the world another group of men over 50 would even undertake such an ordeal, so he believes the record will remain intact.

"When you think of it, you have mosquitoes to contend with in the evening like we did; we thought they were going to stay with us all night, but luckily they didn't last too long," he explains.

When the mosquitoes let up, due in part no doubt to the run on area stores' repellent supplies, Robertson says things worked out OK and the group was able to continue on through the night to 9 a.m. Sunday morning.

(The relay began at 9 a.m. Saturday morning.)

"With all the things one has to experience in something like this, I don't think any other group will attempt to break our record," Robertson concludes.

Lockwood, 55, says the race hasn't affected his outlook on life one way or the other, because no one believes him anyway.

"If I tell somebody I set a world's record, they say, 'yeah,' and that's it."

Few people read the story about the race anyway, Lockwood says.

He says he's personally pleased about participating in the relay, and he's proud of his teammates whom he says "carried him" because he

was not the fastest of the ten runners.

He says each runner ran for an hour and five minutes every hour and five minutes, resting in between.

"At night those mosquitoes were pretty bad, so I bundled up in a sleeping bag and went over to RIT and showered every hour," Lockwood recalls.

Why June 21?

"We picked June 21 because it is

the date of the Equinox — where spring is followed by summer."

Lockwood says he was the only runner at the race who started in spring and finished in summer.

All three credited much younger distance runners who alternated as pacers, who quickly discovered the over-50 set was turning an average time of 6 1/2 minutes for each mile.

"Without the young kids pacing us, we might still be out there," Lockwood says.

horses feeling a little under the weather there are two whirlpool baths large enough to soothe their aching muscles.

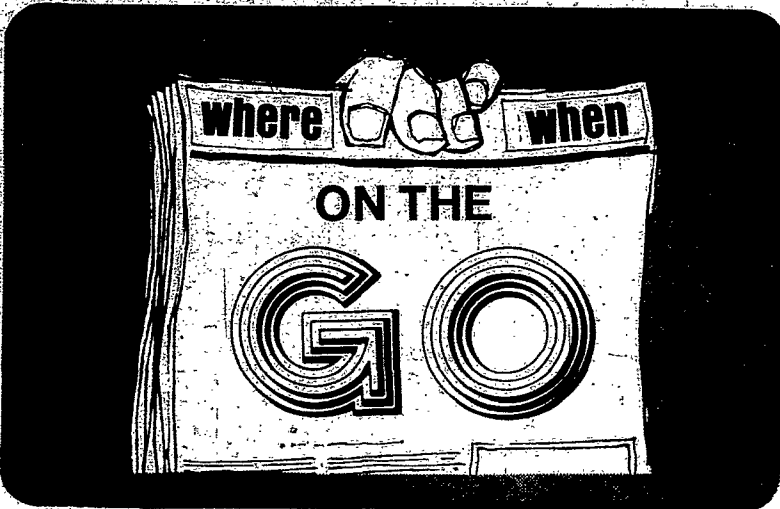
