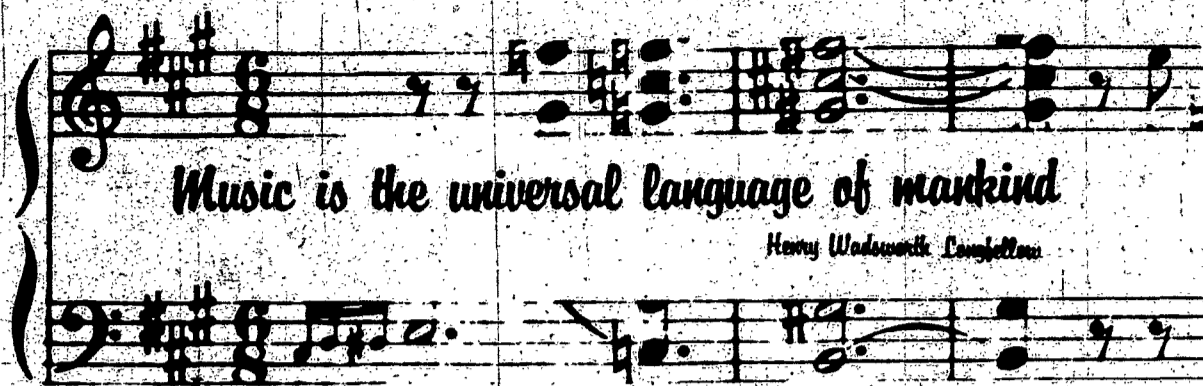

Different Sounds, Same Message

This is another in the series of Rap Around introductions to high school musicians. These young people through their dedication to music have not only provided hours of listening enjoyment but also have found satisfaction and accomplishment through their music.

Though there is a definite distinction between the melodic sounds of "Oh, Happy Days" and Beethoven's Fifth Symphony they both achieve the same result — superb entertainment.

So, too, with St. Agnes senior Marie Pabalan and sophomore Rosemary Scherzi. Both girls are ardent musicians but they achieve their musical goals by different routes. Marie is a flutist with the Rochester Philharmonic Youth Orchestra (RPYO). Rosemary is a singer with the "Sun" folk group at St. Augustine's parish.

According to Rosemary, if she wasn't majoring in science it would be singing because "I love it." In her five years with the group she has discovered that music "makes you realize you can help people by bringing them happiness through music."

She is kept busy with her singing.

The folk group which numbers 35 not only performs at Sunday Mass but gives concerts at nursing homes and Newark State School. Their present project is contacting various nursing homes in other counties, offering to bring their music to the residents. The response has been encouraging so it looks as if the group will be taking their folk entertainment on tour.

Rosemary, along with her group, is involved with the CCD program at Holy Family where she helps youngsters prepare the art and music for First Communion. They have made two recordings which Rosemary proudly displayed; an album of spirituals and a single, "Just a Little Bit of Sunshine."

She admitted she does get nervous when soloing but she confidently declared, "I'm getting used to performing." But whether singing or not, Rosemary is interested in and enjoys all kinds of music.

The day Rap Around talked with Marie Pabalan she was on her way to a soloist competition with the RPYO but she was delighted to stop and discuss her music, especially her love for the classics.

Marie's knowledge of the classical field was impressive as she explained classical, baroque, "lighter than classical," and the impressionists and went on to talk about her favorite composers Debussy and Ravel.

Marie has played the flute for nine years and is now in her fourth year with the RPYO. Her one musical desire is to learn the harp and her eyes sparkled when she

told her reason. "It's a fantastic instrument. It creates lofty thoughts." She also was very emphatic about its versatility. "The harp is used in rock music. Elton John's previous recordings used it as background music."

It's her affiliation with the RPYO which gives her a great sense of accomplishment. "You learn where every piece of music goes, and you discover the brilliance of people like Beethoven." In fact, Marie likes nothing better than to play in the orchestra when it performs his Fifth Symphony.

Besides school, a job and her participation with the RPYO Marie also gives private flute lessons and has recently undertaken the Korean art of self-defense.

Though Marie intends to pursue a nursing career and will attend the State University at Buffalo, music will always be a part of her life. She described it as "creative, a discipline, and universal communication," and went on to sum up her feelings about its benefits: "Everything you learn about music you can relate to other areas of life."
