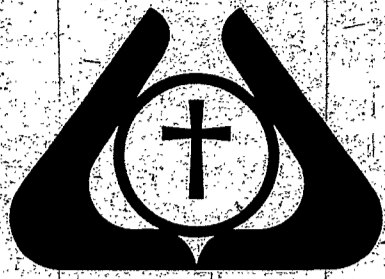

St. John Fisher College announced last week an increase of \$324 in tuition, room and board rates for the 1976-77 academic year.

The Hungers of the Family

The Church recognizes that the family unit is one of the cornerstones of a healthy society. To lend support to that idea, it has established organizations such as Catholic Family Center and the Family Life Office. This series of articles, prepared by the two offices, will explain their programs directed at family enrichment. Each article will explore one segment of the program.

[Second in a Series] COMMUNICATION

God communicated with man first. He took the initiative with us, for example, by choosing Israel as His people and giving her the Covenant. Through His choice of man, giving him the Covenant and the Law, He gave us a means of coming together with Him. Through these guides, the Covenant and the Law, God outlined how man was to communicate with Him. God helped us define what our relationship should be with Him, a relationship set up between Israel and the God of her fathers.

God carried forward the communication of the Old Testament choice of Israel as His chosen people living according to the Covenant and the Law by sending His Son, Christ, to communicate the news of salvation to all people. God is fulfilling His ongoing wish to relate to all people through His new Covenant in Christ.

As God communicates with us and lets us know how we can relate to Him so we have a "hunger" to communicate with each other on the deepest level of our being. Are we always aware of this "hunger" or wish? Do we know that we communicate with those closest to us, as well as others, non-verbally, as well as verbally? Our facial ex-

pressions, tone of voice and bodily posture, as well as the words we use, communicate facts, feeling and thoughts to others. Are we aware that communication involves active listening?

The Catholic Family Center and Office of Family Life program on the "Hunger For Communication" will focus in on such things as — the way we send non-verbal, as well as verbal messages, body language, understanding the meaning of things that are said to us, as well as what we say, and how we can actively listen to others. This will be accomplished by having the program participants become involved in exercises and activities about communication, in addition to presentations by the joint agency staffs.

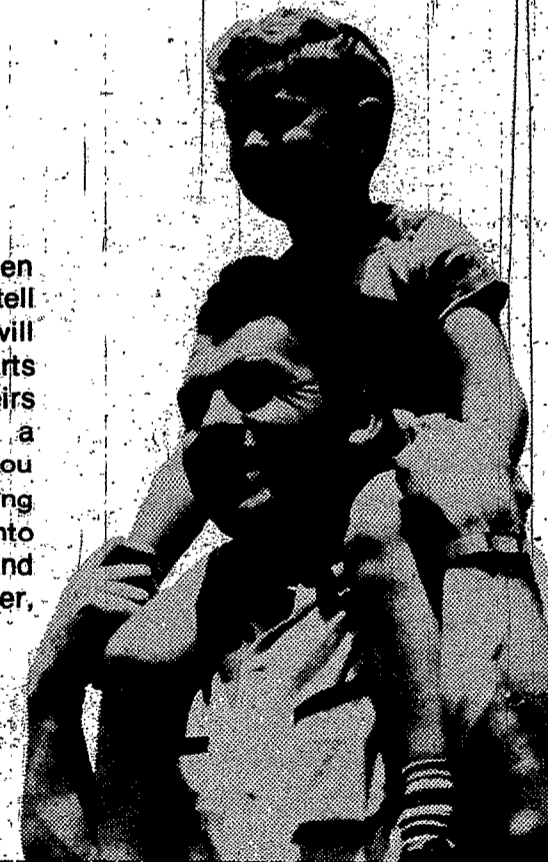
