AS I SEE IT

The 26th and final episode of "The Pallisers" rolled across the small home screen this past week to my disappointment and the rest of the family's immense relief. Twenty some weeks of Victorian England did not set well with this particular space age family whose hearts are more attuned to the NBA and Bionic Woman, respectively, even though the series took up only one hour of their viewing time per week and then at an hour when both basketball and science fiction are not normally screened.

For me, the 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. time slot every Wednesday (if one missed the first screening, there were repeat showings at the same time Friday and Sunday) was quite definitely the high point of my viewing week.

A BBC-Time Life Production screened over the Home Box Office channel on Cable TV which we were wired for late in November. "The Pallisers" was based on the political novels of Anthony Trollope, featuring Plantagenet Palliser, later duke of Omnium, and his beautiful young wife, Glencora.

Trollope's interest in the politics of England was not only literary. He himself after resigning from the Civil Service, stood as a Liberal candidate in 1868, failing, however, to win a seat in the House of Commons.

So vivid was the picture he created of this political forum, of the various clubs and the brilliant entertainment furnished by the hostesses of that time that the viewer could not help learn something of the period.

To give credit where it is due, the producers of this series were marvelous themselves in developing characters and in selection of cast. Title roles played by Philip Latham and Susan Hampshire (Fleur of "The Forsyte Saga") were so credible that as the lovely Glencora lay dying an untimely death with her family about her in the final show I had the need of handkerchief.

Without relying on overt sex, physical violence or contrived machinations, the series kept one coming back week after week to sample the political intrigue, the not always circumspect romances and the growth and change of characters from year to year.

Should Home Box Office decide to rebroadcast the series, I recommend without hesitation that cable subscribers take a look. In the five-month period we have subscribed to the service, the series has outshone the feeble movie schedule week after week. To the criticism — that it has been talky — the chief complaint of the rabble rousers at our house — I can only say it is literate and stylish talk, a commodity so rare on television as to be almost non-existent.
