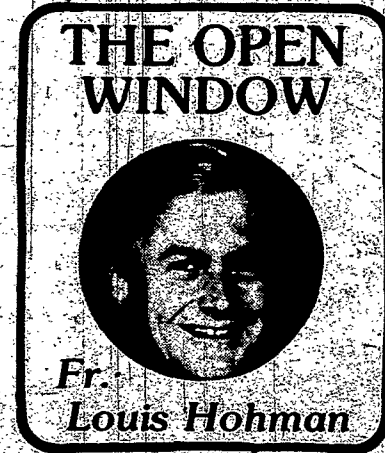

Many of us would like to know the reason why newspaper religion writer John Cogley, Father Charles Davis of England and Father Dan Lyons all quit the Catholic church. Have any of them rejoined the church?

As you probably know by this time Mr. Cogley died recently and so from his particular point of view I guess we'll never know except in so far as he explained that he was simply not able to go along with many of the reactionary positions of the Roman Curia. That at this particular point is between him and his God. We certainly wouldn't want to make a judgment.

Nor can we make a judgment about Father Davis and Father Lyons. We know that the question of celibacy was involved in some way for both of them but may or may not have been crucial to the

situation. It is rather interesting that they are at opposite ends of the spectrum as far as theological positions are concerned. Father Davis was very liberal or, if you prefer, progressive and Father Dan Lyons was very conservative or reactionary if you prefer that term. Frankly I do not know the status of either one of them at present but again it is, as far as I am concerned, a private matter and not really important to the life of the Church. Each man must come to his own crossroads and make his own decisions and the rest of us have to be at least non-judgmental about those decisions.

Why is the pope always an Italian? Why doesn't some other nationality get a chance. And why did the pope reject the Majority Report which was in favor of birth control?

First of all, the pope hasn't always been an Italian. This may sound facetious, but the first one was a Jew. The vast majority of popes through the years have been Italian, I suppose because the pope is also bishop of Rome and a rather large percentage of cardinals are Italian. During the Middle Ages there were quite a few French popes. As far as I know there has been only one Englishman and that was Pope Adrian. I think that as the world gets smaller in terms of communications and transportation we are more and more likely to see the possibility of a non-Italian pope. Some of the news media are already speculating about the possibility of the next pope being of another nationality.

As to your last question 'why did the pope reject the Majority Report in favor of birth control?' I guess the answer is that as far as we can fathom he was told that if he were to accept the majority report there would be a mass of confusion arising in the Church from the fact that so many people felt the Pope could not reverse himself on this or any other matter, and that chaos would result. There was never any statement from the Pope himself as to why he chose the minority report instead of the majority report.
