All elected terms of office are for two years. Appointed members receive one-year terms.

The surge towards unity, toward the bursting of barriers, is present in Bishop, Joseph L. Hogan's decision several years ago: to regionalize the parishes and Catholic institutions of the diocese, and to appoint 10 regional coordinators to lead this surge. Regionalism can be traced back to the Second Vatican Council. There the council fathers challenged the universal church to get back in touch with the common ministry that unites all who are baptized and confirmed in Christ's mission.

Regionalization was not born out of a desire to save money, though it might. It did not arise as a gimmick to "keep the laity off the streets." It was the brainchild of Church administrators looking for a more effective

To quote the Directory of the Pastoral Ministry of Bishops, issued in Rome in 1973, regions "contribute much to concerted pastoral action and ire a necessary means to subsidiarity and a good distribution of ministry throughout the diocese."

As an ideal, the work of sharing ministry among parish communities, of speaking to one another in truth and love about the effectiveness of our outreach as Church is as old as the New Testament. The Church of Antiochhad something to say to the Church of Jerusalem. The spread of the Gospel in Asia Minor mattered to the Christians in Palestine.

Regionalism everywhere in the American Church is springing up as a way of being apostolic. It is a way of renewing ourselves as a diocese. It is sponsored by the universal church:
