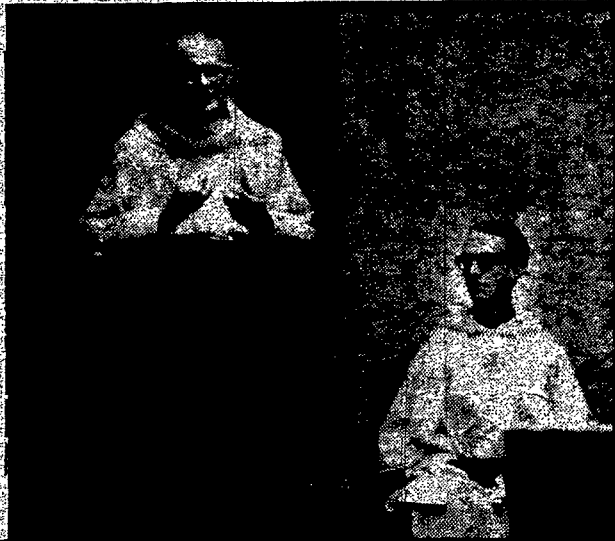


Priests Retreat

As an established expert in personal deficit financing, I should never begin to try to tell someone else how to run the company store.

But I do. I can not resist butting into the pro basketball picture because it amazes me what otherwise sensible businessmen will do in order to be established as "major league."

The National Basketball Association is the establishment. The American Basketball Association is the junior outfit. The ABS shrank from ten to seven clubs this season. It competed for and obtained some of the blue chips out of the college crop. It cost owners in both leagues a ton of money to compete in the auctions. And salaries are out of sight.

Now the ABA wants to buy into the NBA, and this has melted down into a deal whereby four ABA clubs will join the NBA.

It just so happens that only weeks ago the NBA signed a deal with CBS that will put \$27 million into the NBA treasury. This deal included payment for television rights to any new (ABA) clubs that might enter the charmed circle.
