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Christians there. She questioned the elevation of the "comments" to "divine law." She emphasized that the restrictions on the conduct of women didn't prevent them from holding offices in the church.

She also noted Peter's instruction to the early Christians to "be yourselves as living stones, built thereon into a spiritual house, and a holy priesthood, to offer sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." She said that the statement is a call for a priesthood of all Christians, and doesn't exclude women.

Although Christ selected 12 men as Apostles, Ms. Daviau said, they did not name new apostles, but instead, named deacons, some of whom were women, to provide local ministry. The theology surrounding the establishment of Holy Orders at the Last Supper didn't evolve until the second century, she said, and it was then that the ordination of only men to the priesthood became the practice.

The four panelists, of four religious backgrounds, related their experiences in ministry. All expressed the feeling that women are both called and needed in ordained ministry.

Sister Elizabeth Hughes, RSM, consultant for Adult Education Teacher Training, described her participation in the diocesan Permanent Diaconate Task Force, noting that soon many men will be called to a new ministry as permanent deacons. She noted the ministerial role of many sisters, and said that she expected the numbers of women doing such work to increase in the future.

The Rev. Aurelia Hale, a student at Colgate-Rochester Divinity School, noted that women ministers can be especially useful in women's prisons, hospitals and old age homes, where often

religious counseling is not now available.

The Rev. Virginia Mackey, director of the Rochester Judicial Process Commission, noted that her involvement in the prisons has become her ministry, and she feels that many women upon entering ordained ministry will probably also work in fields other than traditional parish work.

The Rev. Florence Hedwall, associate pastor of Bethany Presbyterian Church, said that the churches need to reach groups such as single persons, single parents, widows and widowers, and that women ministers would help in the effort.

## PCNY Meets With Bishops

The Priests Councils of New York State met June 23 in New York City with the bishops of the eight dioceses to discuss the continuing training of priests as "pastoral leaders and men of vision."

Also under discussion was "the establishment of parish goals as a result of consultation with the people," according to a report from the secretary, Father John Fagan of Wading River in the Diocese of Rockville Center.

Summing up the meeting, Father Fagan wrote that retreats and continuing education programs were seen as essential to the creation of a "climate and environment for priests to deepen their faith and their understanding of collegiality and the theology of the Church today."

Delegates from the Diocese of Ogdensburg talked about the Adirondack Park Agency, which they said had dealt unfairly with people who had lived in the area for generations. They asked the other seven priests' councils to look into the matter and join them in their criticism of the agency, which was set up to preserve parkland in a large part of the Ogdensburg diocese.

The Parish Council Congress scheduled for Sept. 10-11 at Mercy High School has had more than 450 of the 600 available places filled, and the Office of Pastoral Ministry urges everyone planning to attend the conference to send applications in as soon as possible. Registration will close July 22.

Linda Decillis, of the Office of Pastoral Ministry, noted that many of the applications received to date have not included a workshop preference. Those who have a preference should notify the office before July 22. Persons without a stated preference will be assigned to a workshop.

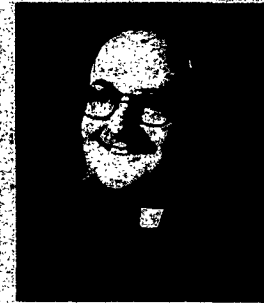
