## Kids' Carnival Strikes Blow at Dystrophy

Michael Zappia, 13, called the Courier-Journal last week to report, "We made \$180 yesterday for muscular dystrophy."

"Me and these other kids," he said, "We had a carnival."

Like Michael, these other kids live in the Kingsbury drive area of Greece. They range from 12 to 16, the majority being in the lower age brackets. They don't know anyone afflicted with muscular dystrophy, "It's just something we like to do — raise money to help."

Last year, they made \$100; the year before, \$25, so, clearly, experience counts.

"This year," Michael explained the increased profit, "We left notices in doors and put lots of signs up, at church and places. We started to plan a month ago, and had a meeting about every day. Everybody chipped in about \$1.50 and we got some more from neighbors. The neighbors donated lots of money."

The spending began at a carnival supply house. Neighborhood stores and business men provided a pound of hot dogs here, cases of

pop there, and a quantity of gadgets to use as prizes. Hot dogs off an outdoor grill were sold for 35 cents apiece. One five-cent ticket bought a session with a fortune teller, or a try at two of the five games. "We had a wishing well and penny pitch, too."

The carnival operators included Linda and Jenny Ray, Lynn and Jerry Rupp, Faith Bock, Theresa Barbieri and Angela Fazio. The contributors: Tops and Convenient food markets, Carvell, Faris Pharmacy, Pierrepont Visual Graphics, Leo J. Roth, Arthur Gaglio and Nancy Blaaser — "she knows how to make real good cakes."
