Julius Erving, more than any other one man in any other sport — Henry Aaron, Bobby Orr, O.J. Simpson — is an out-of-sight, incredible one-man ticket selling phenomenon.

The NBA drew a record 8,800,000 last season, and thanks to the merger, which means 22 clubs now instead of 18, may double that attendance this time around. (The Denver Nuggets have sold 8,300 season tickets, in August.)

440 Bishops Get Lambeth Invitations

London [RNS] — The next gathering of the world's Anglican diocesan bishops has been set for July 22 to Aug. 13, 1978, at the University of Kent near Canterbury.

The Lambeth Conference will emphasize "prayer and waiting and waiting upon God," according to an announcement from the Anglican Consultative Council.

Invitational telegrams were recently sent to 400 bishops in charge of dioceses, and to 40 assistant bishops. The assistants are "from parts of our communion where an indigenous episcopate is fairly recent, and the emphasis will be on younger men much of whose work lies ahead of them," the council said.

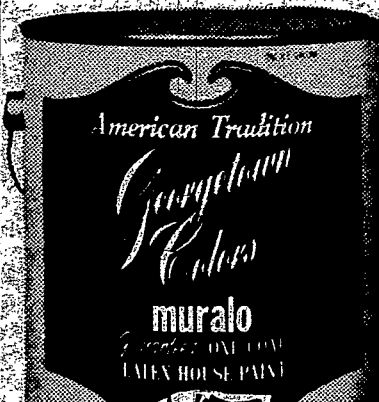
