Catholic Charities

One of the largest social service agencies in the area. Catholic Charities comprises ten agencies offering programs ranging from adoption services to residential care for the elderly including marriage preparation, family counseling, youth ministry, neighborhood organization and summer camp. The programs involve more than 600 employes.

Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Rochester, Inc., is a federation of human service agencies under Catholic auspices Each agency has its own director, goals, and staff. Father Joseph D'Aurizio, as director, of Charities, coordinates activities among the agencies, and with other diocesan departments.

Two of the agencies are operated directly by Father D'Aurizio, Camp, Stella Maris and the St. Elizabeth Guild: Two others, St. Joseph's Villa and St. Ann's Home and the Heritage, are independently incorporated.

The other agencies each have their own directors under Catholic Charities: Catholic Family Center, DePaul Clinic, Family Life Office, Catholic, Youth Organization, Charles Settlement House and Genesee Settlement House.

 Father D'Aurizio points out that his most important function is to coordinate the activities of the agencies, working toward the. overall goals of the Church.

with the directors regularly. Programs with shared sponsorship, drawing on the expertise available in various agencies and departments of the diocese, are the result. One example is youth retreats, co-sponsored by CYO and Teen Seminar, a diocesan department. For consultative services on youth ministry, parishes can turn to the Office of Family Life, and CYO, two Charities agencies, and the Religious Education Department of the diocese.

During the past year, Catholic Charities funded a study with the Office of Human Development examining how banks, utilities and other organizations treat unemployed persons.

Father D'Aurizio also pointed out that the CYO, the Catholic Family Center, the Family Life Office, Genesee and Charles Settlement Houses all work closely with parishes on educational programs and other activities.

The Catholic Family Center was responsible for the Vietnamese refugee program, During the year, Vietnamese refugees were settled in the diocese. The program was in cooperation with the United States Catholic Conference and the

federal government. The work with the Vietnamese hasn't ended, as the Family Center has assisted the. Vietnamese in forming a social and cultural group.

During 1975, \$150,000 was spent on improvements at Camp Stella Maris, bringing it up to state standards and winterizing the main building. The improvements have meant an increase in the use of the camp, Father D'Aurizio noted. In addition to the summer camping sessions, six weeks for boys and girls sessions, and four for family camping, the camp has also been used for Confirmation classes, family retreats, vocation weekends, sisters and priests retreats and by other groups seeking retreat. facilities.

A major initiative the past few years, Father D'Aurizio said, is the CYO Youth Development Program. The program includes four different retreat programs for teenagers, and two programs designed to reach groups not previously active in CYO activities. Inner City Outreach offers programs in four parishes in Rochester's inner city: Project Family Life Office, Father D'Aurizio Poder provides similar services for Spanish speaking youth

> Reaching people with problems is that necessary first step for all the agencies. The services they provide are designed for the problems of the specific person at the time, such as Birthright, psychiatric counseling, residential care, or marriage counseling. The other half:

of the work is dedicated to preventative programs: family education, marriage preparation, youth development, or medical

The availability of these services is made known on the agency level and by Catholic Charities. Brochures are available on specific programs, and agencies distribute them and conduct public awareness activities in accordance with their programs.

Another activity is the Courier-Journal Christmas Appeal, which raised \$42,290 in 1975. The funds are used by the Catholic Family Center to provide food vouchers to families and individuals About 1,200 were distributed during 1975.

The Office of Catholic Charities receives no diocesan funding. It derives its budget from these three sources: an assessment paid by member agencies, income from an-endowment, and donations made directly to the office. The budget for the fiscal year beginning Jan. 1, 1976 for the office is \$66,051, which includes office expenses, salaries, temporary financial aid to persons seeking help, and a program budget.

The Charities agencies receive funding from a variety of sources.

The only agency receiving diocesan funding is the Family Life Office, which receives \$6,000 a year. The remainder of its budget comes from Charities funds.

St. Joseph's Villa; providing residential care for disturbed youth, receives its funding from the

Monroe County Department of Social Services.

St. Ann's Home and the Heritage and Camp Stella Maris are funded by user fees.

St. Elizabeth Guild, directed by Father D'Aurizio, is presently inactive. The organization purchased homes for use as group homes; two have been transferred to St. Joseph's Villarduring the last

The other Charities agencies are major beneficiaries of the Community Chest drive. For instance, the Catholic Family Center receives 62 per cent of its budget of \$912,000. The DePaul Clinic, CYO, Charles and Genesee Settlement. houses also receive Community Chest grants, Total Community Chest grants to Charities agencies for 1975 totaled more than \$1:2 million. The agencies also receive payments from government sources for services offered under government programs.

The budget for the commission was \$12,083 last year, of which \$9,500 went as a contribution to GEM_Father Latus "never asked for more money" and asked that the directorship be continued on a part-time (two days a week) basis.

It publicizies its services through the diocesan guidelines and policy manual.

The director works closely with the Bishop's Office, Pastoral Ministry, and Liturgy. It reaches the grass roots by relating the support it can provide parish staffs and by publicizing ecumenical development through the Courier-Journal and secular media — "but I heavily emphasize" the "Courier-Journal" Noonan said.

Hopefully, the office "stimulates nitiatives in the area of ecumenism which in turn results in brining all the people of God closer together;" Noonan summed up.
