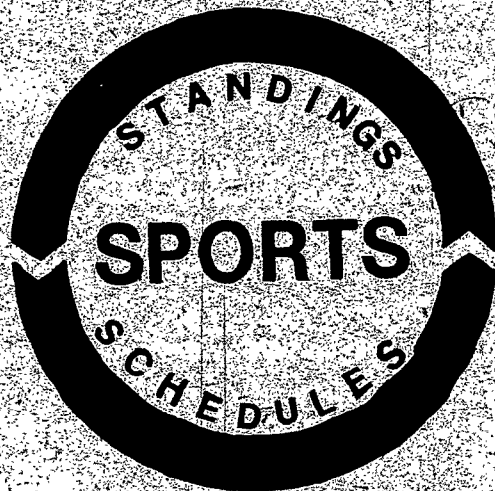

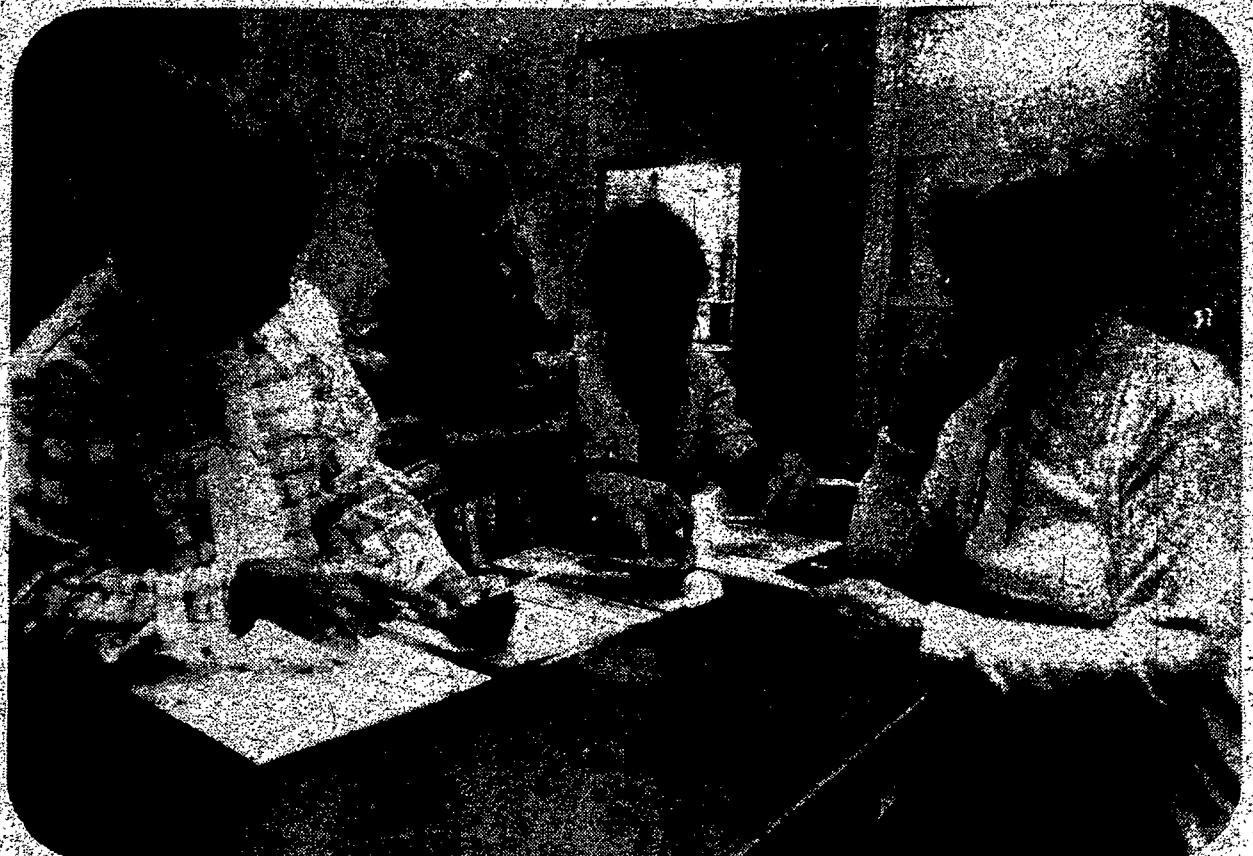

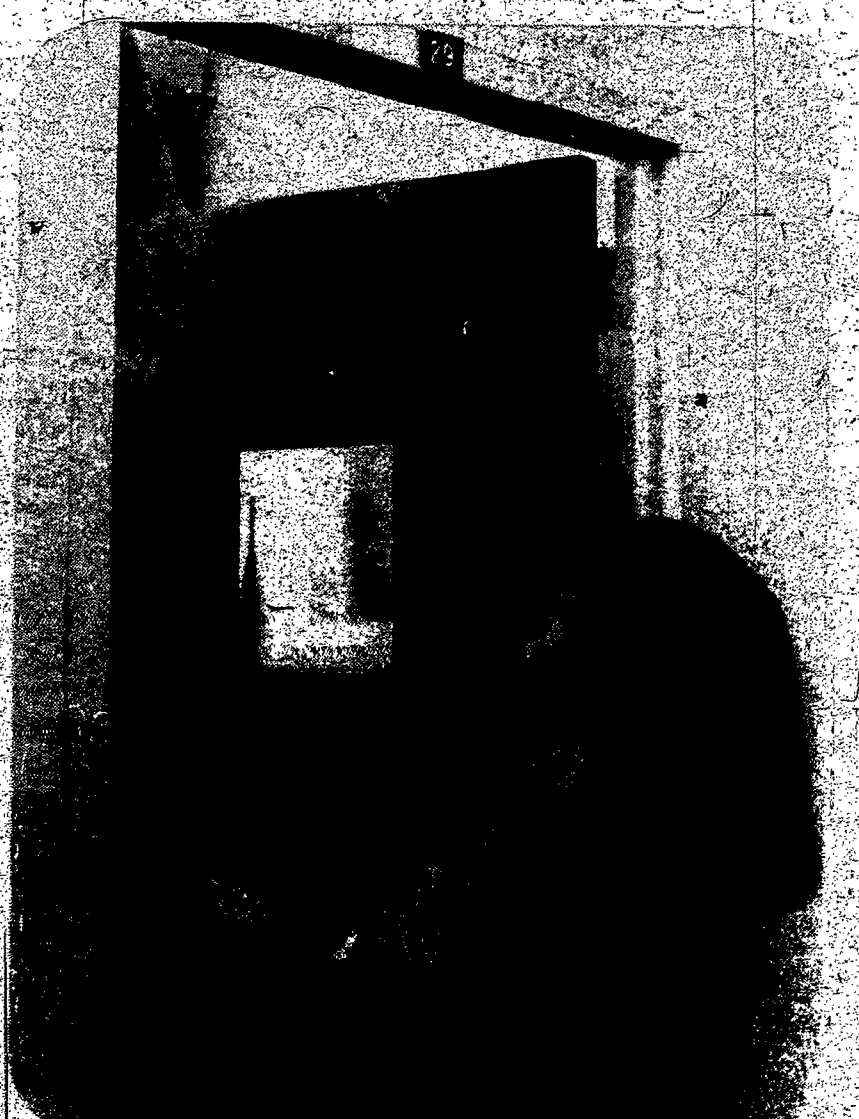
Down in the office, Sister Helen Kannan happily admitted things had gone very well and that no frosh had yet become lost. "They're all accounted for," she said.
